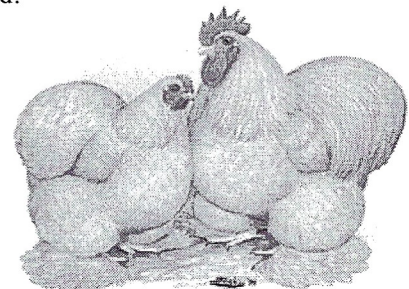

The "CHICKEN" is Among the Six Finalist Species Chosen for the Next Phase of the National Genome Project

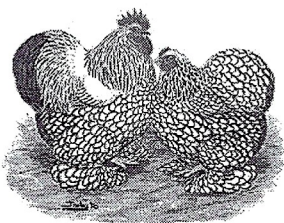
In summary, on Thursday, 23 May, The Washington Post reported that a council of experts at the National Institute of Health's National Human Genome Research Institute has launched the newest chapter in genetic research. Last year scientists announced that they had identified and placed in order virtually all 3.1 billion "letters" of the human genetic code.

By unveiling the DNA sequences of far-flung members of the "tree of life" and then lining each up, gene-to-gene, against the human genome, scientists expect to deepen their understanding of the evolutionary processes and uncover the causes of many human diseases.

In addition to the chicken, the final selections include the chimpanzee, honey bee, sea urchin, tetrahymena thermophila (a small yeast like organism) and various fungi species (as a group). Lobbyists for the chicken dubbed their nominee "the premier non-mammalian vertebrate model organism," in part because it develops in an egg instead of a uterus; thus, facilitating the study of its development.

Hopefully this National Research Project will lead to a greater understanding of the genetics of the chicken at our level (breeders), and also provide insight into better disease control methods and techniques in the foreseeable future.

Future Computers may Operate on a New Generation of Microchips - Chicken Feathers!

Summary of an Article presented in The Washington Post on Monday, July 18, 2002

Research efforts at the University of Delaware, under the ACRES Project (Affordable Composites from Renewable Sources) lead by Richard Wool, have determined that chicken feathers could one day replace silicon in a new generation of microchips. Sound strange? Well, it's not so far fetched!

A microchip is basically a wafer of silicon inscribed with a dense maze of transistors. For a chip to do its computational magic, electronic signals must travel across these transistors. These signals travel faster in some materials than in others. One possible alternative for increasing a chip's speed is finding a material with less resistance than silicon, the current material of choice. "Air" allows the fastest movement of all because there is basically no resistance.

Researchers working on the Univ. of Delaware, ACRES Project, knew that feathers contain lots of air and the presence of air would make electrons travel faster. The team took chicken feathers and plant oils and molded them into a composite material that looks and feels like silicon and then tested it for speed. They found that the speed almost doubled the rate of silicon. While still slower than air, this is a significant finding. While "chicken feather chip technology" is a long way from production, it is an exciting candidate for a new generation of microchips!

It was also reported that Richard Wool and his team at the Univ. of Delaware are also collaborating with Tyson Food Inc. They have been tasked to find candidate materials for other innovative approaches to making non-load bearing replacement parts for the company's fleet of several thousand trucks.

In addition, a spokesperson from Tyson Food Inc. indicates that his company is working with a number of researchers, including Richard Wool, in an effort to "use every part of the bird."

So, "stay tuned" Cochins!! With all those extra feathers, we may have an edge on the market!

Northeast II District Update:

Well I hope those cochins are growing and you can start to see the champions in your pens by now. I hatched out about 50 straight partridge large fowl this year and another 20 or so of my experimental ¼ Partridge Plymouth Rock crossed Cochins as well. The straight bred birds are looking better every day and hopefully some will be ready for the fall shows. I hope you are all planning on attending the Eastern National that will be held at the Southern Ohio Poultry Breeders Show in Lucasville. I'll have a display of the Partridge Large Fowl and I hope you'll do your best to support this show as well. You won't regret attending this show. It's my personal favorite show to attend as those Southern Ohio guys know how to put on a great show.

If you would like to offer any specials for the national, it's not too late. Last year, we had a host of awards from many of our members for the national that was held in Richmond. The Southern Ohio Poultry Club has provided us with \$500 in prize money to award as we saw fit. While there will be some minor awards for various varieties in bantam and large fowl, there are also some awards for displays and trios. We had very few displays and trios shown in Richmond so let's get with it and get those birds ready for the show. Contact Tom Roebuck if you want to sponsor any specific awards.

Our club has done an outstanding job in promoting Cochins and we have a lot to be thankful for. The club website is a good resource for individuals wanting to learn

more about the breed and our newsletter is second to none. A lot of the credit for these items goes to Tom Roebuck so if you see him, thank him for all he has done on behalf of our club.

Avian Influenza has really hurt the fancy in our region and there are still some concerns and restrictions in our district regarding poultry sales, shows and swaps. In Delaware as of the end of July, our local sales are once again allowed to sell poultry. Virginia birds are still banned from entering the state. The restriction on shows has not yet been lifted in Maryland as no poultry will be exhibited at the Maryland State Fair in late August and many of the county fairs as well. Pennsylvania has a blood testing requirement to sell birds through their poultry auctions and after calling and consulting with the Delaware State Veterinarian and told it was ok to take birds across the state line, I found myself in deep you know what for attempting to do so. I learned a great lesson that everyone at the sale barn may not know what the rules and regulations are pertaining to the health requirements at that sale. Be sure and call the State Veterinarians office in the state you are taking birds to if you need to cross state lines to sell some of your birds.

I recently heard that Virginia will not lift the ban on shows and sales until 90 days after the last confirmed case of Avian Influenza. This may impact some shows in that state as the last reported case of A.I. was on July 3rd which would result in a ban until October 3rd. Let's keep our fingers crossed and hope we've seen the end of this outbreak.

As a final note, be sure to do your best to practice good bio-security on your place to protect your birds from this and other poultry diseases. The fancy is often looked at as a cause of disease outbreaks that occur in the commercial sector but we all take far better care of our birds and will do far more to protect them than anyone in the commercial industry. The A.I. outbreak in the commercial industry was an exercise in what not to do as the disease was spread from house to house by the industry personnel themselves. Let's insure that our hobby stays strong and healthy by always doing the right thing when it comes to guarding the health and well being of our birds. Until next time, take care of those champions.

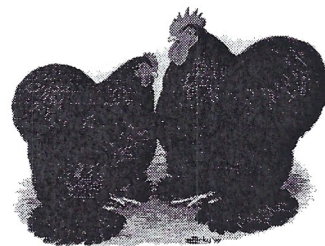
We are working on coming to Lucasville. We need a good chicken sitter and lots of paper work. I hope to be there and meet a few of the people that I read about.

Black Cochins

By Tom Roebuck Jr.

I had a little extra space so I thought I would point out some things regarding Black Cochins as they pertain to the other articles I have included in this newsletter. In reading these other articles I ask that you keep in mind that they were all written quite some time ago. Twenty years or more in all cases. Things change over time as you can see by reading about feeding methods and suggestions.

These days most breeders supplement their scientifically mixed breeder or game birds crumbles with other items as well. I would urge the beginning Cochin Fancier to ask some of our breeders just what they do feed their birds. I bet they would be happy to share their "secrets!"

In all the articles, the writers stress what they feel is important in a Cochin, and these traits still hold true today. Black Cochins should not have purple sheen or purple barring. Black Cochins should have a Reddish-bay eye. They should have yellow or dusky yellow feet, legs and beaks.

I endeavor to be as accurate as possible when passing along information so when I found undercolor to be a hot topic in a couple of the articles I consulted our two Standards of Perfection. I found something very interesting regarding Black Cochins.

In the APA Standard of Perfection the undercolor required is slate. However, the following Disqualifications are listed: "More than one-half inch of positive white in any part of plumage, except less than one inch in undercolor of hackles and saddles in cocks."

In the ABA Bantam Standard regarding undercolor in black varieties "any appearance of any other color excepting varying shades of gray in the undercolor in any section of the plumage," is considered a disqualification. In this regard the two publications do not agree as applied to Cock birds. Interesting, don't you think?

Breeding Black Pekin Bantams

A Successful Exhibitor Provides Hints for Beginners

Specially Written for "Poultry" - by H. Duncan

October 1st, 1938

I take it that any breeder or prospective breeder of Pekin bantams will regard type as the first essential to consider; without type the Pekin certainly loses nearly all its beauty. Correct type may be described as resembling a square block with the corners cut off - in other words, a ball.

The Head of the Breeding Pen:

The points I require in a stud male to head a breeding pen are: short and broad in back and more particularly, as full and broad in the saddle as possible; heavily feathered on thighs and below the hock joint. The feathering around the hock joint is of special importance for so long as there is an abundance of feather in this area there is not likely to be a deficiency in toe feathering. The cushion should rise from the base of the hackle and form one unbroken curve up the back, ending with the curve of the tail featherings. The weight of the male should not exceed 24 ounces. (*U.S. Bantam Standard - Cock 30 ounces, Cockerel 26 Ounces*)

The Female Side of the Pen:

The stock hens should show the curves, which are a feature of Pekins, still more plainly than the male, for the feathers of the female are much broader and more round at the tips than those of the male. Both tail and hock feathers should be very soft in the quill, with a disposition to curl inwards. I always endeavor to counter-balance any defects in a stock fowl by the presence of good points in those of the opposite sex. The weight of the hen should not exceed 20 ounces. (*U.S. Bantam Standard - Hen 26 ounces, Pullet 24 Ounces*)

Better in Second Season:

Pekins, particularly the males, do not acquire their full shape or abundance of feather during their first year. Many specimens, who in their first season appear quite ordinary looking, develop into splendid exhibits in their second year. The pullets often improve greatly in cushion, becoming more full and round.

Double-mating Unnecessary:

Though some breeders may resort to a system of double mating in order to produce choice specimens of each sex, it is my experience that both sexes may be bred successfully from one breeding pen. Many of my best winners have been bred this way.

Cleanliness an Important Point:

After the breeding pen is chosen, the bantams comprising the pen should be well dusted with insect powder, and their legs should be touched with camphorated oil to keep down the scaly leg. This should be done once monthly, whether it appears to be required or not. Some breeders trim the tails, vents and hocks of their stock Pekins. Provided they are kept clean and free from insects this practice is entirely unnecessary, as I have proved to my own satisfaction many times.

Guard Against Dampness:

Peking chicks should be confined in a dry pen for the first two weeks, if possible, in such a position that rays of sunshine can enter it. After a fortnight, the chicks should be allowed to run out on grass, but it is important to ensure that they are returned to their pen before the sun sets. Should the grass get wet

through the night the chicks should be kept in until it has dried. More Pekins die as a result of dampness than from any other cause. The chicks are handicapped in this direction through possessing so much foot feathering. Once the foot feathering gets wet, it takes a considerable amount of time to dry.

Observe Care in Feeding:

Pekin chicks are hardy and will thrive on ordinary chick feed from the earliest stages. Avoid feeding mash during the growing period since it very often results in "sour crop." I provide dry breadcrumbs for the first day the chicks are out of the nest, commencing with the chick mixture on the second day. The chicks receive as much as they can eat. I regard it as a mistake to allow so many hours to elapse before the first feed is given. When feed is made available from the beginning it will be found that the chicks eat a little at a time, whereas hungry chicks certainly overload their crops, which frequently results in trouble. Finely cut spinach, fed once daily after the second week, will keep the youngsters fit. There will be no problem with blocked vents if this method of feeding is followed. Onions, again finely cut, are fed once weekly and a raw meat bone is provided once or twice a week for the youngsters to pick at. After six weeks I feed wheat to the extent of one-quarter of the total ration, gradually increasing it until the chicks are weaned from the original chick mixture on to a ration comprised of three parts of wheat and one part of cracked maize. The provision of plenty of food hastens maturity and early laying, which of course checks growth.

Chief Factors for Success:

I regard the provision of ample good food and cleanliness as the chief factors contributing to my success with Pekins. About every three weeks I dust my chicks with a mixture of one part of Keating's Insect Powder and three parts of flowers of sulphur. I find this assists in growth and luster of feather in addition to keeping down vermin. If one procures good stock at the commencement, success will depend on individual management.

Care in Preparing for Show:

Great care must be exercised in washing Pekins preparatory to exhibiting them, for there is always a danger of the bantam collapsing during the operation. Always see that the crop is empty before washing, as this will tend to lessen the danger. The water used should not be above blood heat, and I advise the use of "Lux," which I find does not affect the eyes like most other soaps. One should make certain of soaking the intended exhibit fully twenty minutes before rubbing the feathers well. Above all else, rinse thoroughly, and squeeze the tail feathers and wings, whilst doing so, completing the whole operation in thirty minutes.

Importance of Weight:

Never waste time and entrance fees by benching a Pekin that is overweight. Success is much more likely to be ensured by keeping below the limit. My recent Brisbane National winning hen, which I regard as the best I have ever bred, weighs 18 oz. My heaviest male Pekin weighs 23 oz. The abundant plumage

of these bantams make them appear heavier, with the result that those who guess at weight sometimes make errors which are unfair to the exhibitor and misleading to those who rely on their judgment. A word to novice exhibitors: Do not be discouraged by adverse reports on an exhibit, particularly when a competent judge has seen fit to award it a prize. No individual can claim perfection of knowledge covering all breeds and varieties of fowls and bantams. Study the Standard, visit the shows for yourself and mix with acknowledged good breeders of the variety in which you are interested and it will not be long before you acquire a sound knowledge of the finer points which reveal the difference between an ordinary specimen and a champion.

Author's Note:

It will be noted that Mr. Duncan stressed the matter of weights in Pekins. In the final chapter of this book the subject of weights is discussed which I feel throws some light on the reason as to why birds were bred to these lighter weights in the 1930's.

A point worthy of mention is the matter of whether feathers should be removed around the vent in order to improve fertility. Mr. Duncan does not feel it is necessary and in some cases we have also found this to be true. However, we usually make a practice of removing feathers from this area either by clipping or plucking them. Of later years we have resorted to the method of plucking the feathers from around the vent of the female, mainly above the vent and sides, and plucking the male with the accent on removing feathers below and around the vent.

When the feathers are clipped, slight stubs remain and it is possible that these stubs could cause inconvenience to both parties at the time of contact. Incompatibility could then occur with a loss of fertility.

We would therefore recommend plucking the feathers, which will then grow normally again, as opposed to clipping, which leaves stubble, and will not grow back until the bird molts out again.

**CI Editor's Note: I copied this article from "The Pekin Bantam in Australia" by W. J. Plant. The soft cover book (187 pages) was written in 1982 and contains a good amount of information on Australian Pekins. I should probably make mention that Cochin Bantams are called Pekins in Australia and Europe. Although Mr. Duncan's article was written in 1938 I thought there were some very good points that still hold true today. He did not really focus on Black Cochin specific items, though we can safely draw the conclusion that this was his specialty, but he did key on some very important items; cleanliness, keeping your birds dry, and the importance of proper feeding. Please keep in mind the year that this article was written. The feeds today are much better than in the 1930's and I am not sure where you could find flower of sulphur! I found his description of the male and female representatives for a breeding pen very relevant to what we should look for in our breeders today. It is also important to heed his advice to never breed two birds together with the same defect. This will only solidify that trait in your offspring. I don't know that I am on board with his suggestion of soaking the birds for a good 20 minutes before scrubbing the feathers though. This would make show preparation time per bird quite taxing, and I think that if kept in a clean environment from the start your soaking time should be minimal. Of course we all have our own tricks and ways of washing, but as Mr. Duncan stated it is of utmost importance to thoroughly rinse the soap out of your birds.*

BLACK COCHIN BANTAMS

This article has been talked about and the breed characteristics have been worked on till there is very little to say, but I will endeavor to work a little lesson in another way round.

To me, the nearest to perfection bantam we have today is the Black Cochin. 'Why? Well, I will tell you. It is not that other breeds have not been handled as extensively, but it is a fact that the ones that have taken up the Black Cochin and pushed this breed to the front are fanciers that worked years and years on one section to get it where it ought to be. Then when they get this section it is another one that in worked on with the same determination. I was thinking a few moments ago, where would I go if I wanted a good Jersey cow, and in looking over the Jersey Bulletin I find that in the limelight there are about four or five breeders that stand out alone, so to speak. I wondered if I was to want a good Milk goat, where I would go and in looking over The Goat World I find that four or five are also mentioned as the REAL LEADERS. And when I ask where can I improve my Black Cochins with new blood or an out cross and I find in looking over the Year Books of the National Bantam Association, now gone, and the American Bantam Association that after you pick out four you about have the REAL dyed-in-the-wool breeders of that variety.

So what does a fellow do under such existing circumstances? Well, it is no secret with me: I go and take a bird say one-fourth blood of the bird I have in mind, that has about what I want brought out in a certain section and I use say a female that is something like I want and then I set every egg from this Stud Mating and out of 40 or 50 eggs set, I generally will get one or two or maybe three that is better than their parents, and I keep on year after year to perfect certain sections. Take my First Cockerel at the Chicago Coliseum Show of 1917 and what did he do? Schilling took his photo and before a number of breeders stated that he took the best photo he had ever taken of a Cochin to that date. Look at his foot and you will see what Schilling meant. The Standard, after being touched up to make what was considered a perfect model, is nothing like this cockerel was when it came to the feathering on the foot. (*Editor note: I have a copy of this particular photo, but it would not reproduce well. As Mr. Caskey stated there is a distinct profusion of foot feathering.*) If you have a Year Book of the A. B. A. since 1917 you can see this bird's photo. Look at it and my point will be made clear. Another thing Black Cochins have not found in any great amount in other varieties of bantams; proportion as a whole. Say, did you ever look over a bunch of Cochin pictures and notice the different poses that were taken of different birds? It is to laugh at times, when I look at some of the pictures when it comes to the depth of a Cochin.

Some breeders or would-be breeders think it makes no difference what kind of a bird a fellow has in Cochins, in that, if he doesn't have depth, he doesn't have proportion. I have watched Krum judge Cochins and I think he is one of the most consistent judges of Cochins anywhere and he hardly takes the little creeper and crawler out of the coop. As stated above, that type of bird does not have proportion. Have your birds high enough off the ground to make a breeder. That is important and I'll tell you why. Because if you do not have a bird fit as a

breeder you will have to keep two kinds of birds on the place, one as a breeder and one as a show bird. The standard of perfection never intended that such a state of affairs should be.

Another thing that is forgotten at times is length of feather. Take the four varieties of Cochins that are standard: Partridge, Black, Buff, and White, and they will run as mentioned in length of feather and that is the reason you cannot get a uniform bunch of Cochins in the four colors.

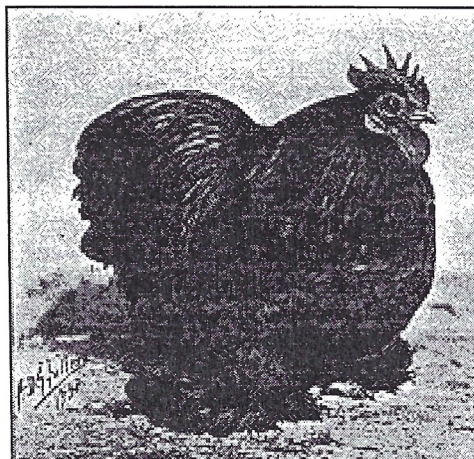
And then we have the fellow that is a consistent breeder of birds in the Cochin females that weigh about 16 to 18 ounces. Does he win? Occasionally, but his birds are weak and he loses the hen when she has started to lay her first eggs, while another dies on the nest, and he just exists. Folks, it is not Standard to use such birds, and I say without fear or favor that I think in five years no one with such birds will WIN with birds of that weight.

Toys.

Color. There is something strange to me that color of a bird such as the Cochin that has been bred for so many years should be other than black, but the New Standard calls for SLATE undercolor.

If in showing at some show you do not get placed with a bird remarkable in type and top color, do not abuse the Judge, as it is his duty, especially after this year and then he would be working against the working of the standard. The Judge is usually a very agreeable fellow if you will be half way white with him.

Looseness of feather is very essential in a Cochin. Did you ever know what made a Cochin hard or harsh in feathering, while another was soft? Nothing hard about that after you have been breeding them a few years. It is the downy under-fluff appearance that makes or kills you as a Cochin breeder. Only about a half dozen breeders has it through their entire flock to my knowledge. It makes the feathers stand out and gives them that massive appearance in their diminutiveness. God bless the man that invented the Black Cochin. May his memory never be forgotten.

Breeding Black Cochin Bantams

There are those who are still carried away with the idea that because the Black Cochin is a solid colored bird, the production of high-class specimens is a very simple matter. They soon learn, however of their mistake. Among the breeders of this variety who raise from 50 to 100 birds each season, when the season is over the real high-class show specimens all come in clusters of one. The value of a good Black Cochin breeder should be divided into four parts. First should be vitality; second, shape; third, length, texture and profusion of feathers; and fourth, color, and the relative importance should come in the order named. First and foremost in a good breeding bird is vigor, if you want to stay in the game. The greatest characteristic is shape in a Cochin, for remember the finest colored specimen is not a Cochin when lacking in Cochin form and feathering.

About mating - as a general proposition the thing to do is to select for stock birds those of both sexes that come most closely to the breed standard. When compelled to sacrifice this or that point, it is hard to determine which one you would prefer to lose sight of, but never lose sight of shape. However, the kind of mating that has usually produced the best result is about as follows: a male of standard weight, low carried head and with legs set well apart with foil round breast, a short back and tall showing as much cushion as possible, head with a broad skull, low comb evenly serrated and short beak to give the appearance of a massive head, and good round eye.

The cushion tendency in back is one of the hardest features to secure in males, but by breeding from the fullest-cushioned and shortest-backed females this can gradually be acquired. Length and carriage of tail is also an important point in the breeding male. It should be short and carried rather low. But how are we to get short feathers in one section, and extremely long ones in another? Well, it can be done by using birds that are short in tail or medium-short and then mate the offspring back on the male side or female, which ever you have the best breed specimen.

The color of a Black Cochin should be a lustrous greenish black, free from bronze or plum coloring and free from purple barring. However, never mate two extremes together in color, but try to make a medium shade of color in both male and female. For color, pick a male that is good color but not real high-colored, and a female to match his color as near as possible, and put as much width of feather in your mating as possible. The females, which go to a male as described, should be low broad-bodied birds with deep round breasts, with broad high cushions and heads carried low. This naturally pulls the bird down and forward, giving the true Cochin carriage.

If you were to ask which are the hardest points to get right, one would have to mention four: shape of back; shape of tail; shape and carriage of wing; and leg & toe feathering. As to these four, the only way to overcome them is by careful line breeding from birds possessing these desirable characteristics to the highest possible degree. Many have been breeding for years and the perfect bird has not yet been produced.

Lesson on Breeding Black Cochin Bantams

ABA Bantam Culture Course

Black Cochin Bantams, from the point of view of the beginner, possess certain advantages over the other color varieties, being far more suitable for city districts, or backyards, whilst for exhibition purposes very little is necessary except taking due care of the foot feathers and in some cases washing. Black Cochins are bred to a high degree of perfection and good birds are not difficult to obtain. The desired color is a uniform lustrous "beetle-green," as seen to greatest degree of perfection in the large fowl Black Hamburgs and Black Langshans.

It will always be found that blacks with a really good surface color, combined with good yellow legs, always show more or less white at the skins; and if black be continually mated to black, the richness and density of color, as well as the sheen are liable to be lost. This is true with all yellow-legged black breeds.

In breeding blacks, double mating is necessary if one is to be really successful. It has been said that it is possible to breed exhibition specimens of both sexes from the same pen; no doubt it would be if males with light undercolor were allowed to win - but a Cochin that is partly white can never be a black one.

To breed the best cockerels it is essential to have the soundest colored male you can find; with him mate three or four hens that are ideal in shape, and if they are bred from a cockerel breeder you should obtain from such a pen absolutely sound cockerels. In the pullet breeding pen have a cock ideal in shape, excelling in yellow legs, with brilliant green top color; his undercolor should be light in the fluff, but not in the shaft of the feather.

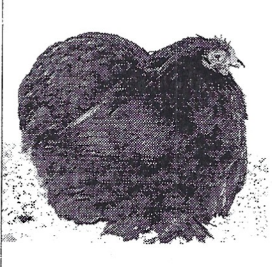
Herein lies the secret of breeding first class exhibition females, providing you have mated to such a male exhibition females that are pullet bred. Always remember that too much green sheen on both sides produce bronze and purple shades in the progeny - a mistake usually made by a beginner.

At some shows you will notice several specimens showing bronze coloration, which detracts from the rich beetle-green effect of the plumage. I would not by any means suggest discarding such males, but they should be correctly mated. The best results are obtained by mating a male showing bronze to females of a dull plumage (not, of course the purple seen in purple barring). This counteracts the dull plum color, the result being sound, rich beetle green sheened offspring.

Perhaps a few notes on the greatest faults in blacks at the present time will be helpful. Light undercoloring seems to show up often in the neck hackle of the males. Watch the color of the eye; many fail at this point. Darks hazel eyes are completely foreign to the standard and should be regarded as a serious fault. One very prevalent defect is split wings and wings carried so low that the tips of the secondaries point to the ground. The standard demands that the wings be carried up close to under the saddle, the ends not to be seen. This fault greatly diminishes both the value and beauty of a Cochin and tells heavily in any good competition. There is also the danger of leg color being ignored by judges and exhibitors alike. We know that a certain amount of latitude is permissible in blacks, however, a rich, yellow legs and beak should be bred for. There are a number of strains of Black Cochin Bantams that possess reddish bay eyes and brilliant yellow legs.

This variety can be improved very much by a little care in feeding. A little linseed twice weekly assists greatly the green sheen of the plumage; and a spoonful of tasteless red pepper in the mash for each dozen Bantams twice or thrice a week does wonders with leg color.

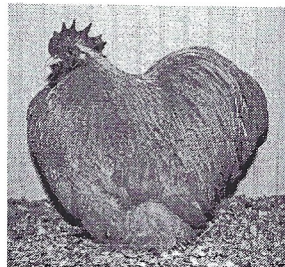

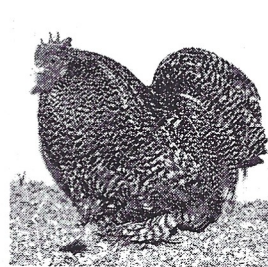

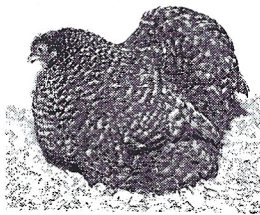

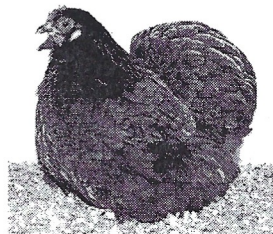
BV Barred Cockerel

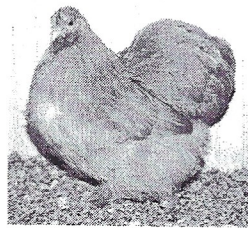

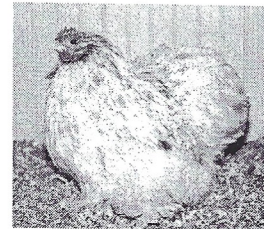

Lesson on Black Cochin Bantams

ABA Bantam Culture Course

The Black Cochin Bantam stands out today as the most popular of the whole bantam family. The bantam fan who is looking for a variety that nearly approaches perfection can find that variety in the Black Cochin.

In some strains of Black Cochins the color is way off inasmuch as it has a distinct purple sheen instead of the lustrous green sheen. Color is very important in Black Cochins because those that do not have it are just left out of the ribbons in any show where there is a bit of real competition. There has been a decided improvement in the color since the under color was changed from black to a slate. The single mating can be used to produce good Black Cochins, however where space permits and one can properly house sufficient birds for the double mating it is most always advisable to use the double mating method. There are some breeders who do not agree but those who have attained the most success use the double mating system. A double mating can be developed, from any single mating bred birds and once the producers of tip top cockerels and those that produce tiptop pullets are identified, they should be separated and the line breeding system adopted. There is no solid set rule as to what the type and color must be for either the single or double mating. Care must be taken to have color that is of the greenish black type and with under color not too light in slate color. Don't expect to mate one season and do wonders with them because in most cases you will not. Study the birds and their offspring and then start the real breeding. Remember you do not need blue ribbon winners to produce birds of like quality. If that were true, very few winners would be sold.

Shape is very important in Cochins. A bird too high on legs is no good while on the other hand one too low on legs is equally as bad. Legs of medium length combined with proper feather will be the first step to a good Black Cochin. A bird with a high head carriage and the tail low is a funny sight seen

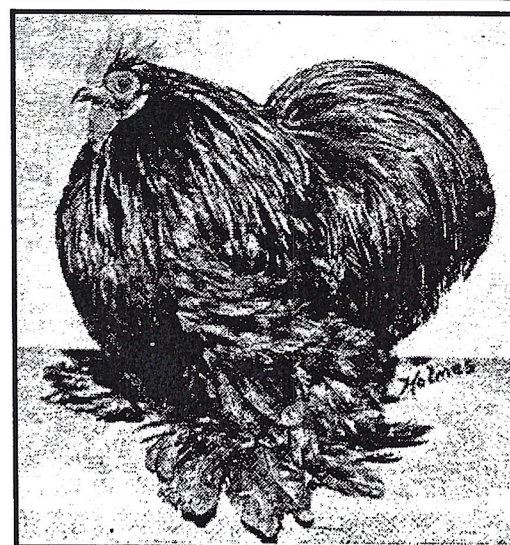
often in the exhibition pen of the beginner. The head and tail should almost be of equal height.

Black Cochins, like all other Cochins should have a broad, deep and well rounded body with legs of medium length. Their feathering loose and plentiful, and they should be well feathered in cushion, fluff, hocks, and shanks down to the end of the middle toe. Remember that the one main thing that is characteristic of all Cochins is long, soft and fluffy plumage. Head is short and broad, and furnished with a neat but rather small single comb. A large comb on a Cochin detracts from its other good qualities, so the smaller the comb the better. Face is smooth and fine texture of skin. A good healthy Cochin will have a bright red comb, wattles and ear lobes. The neck is rather short and thick and neatly arched, with an abundance of hackle plumage. The breast is broad and well rounded. The back should be short and broad. The hackle feathers and tail almost meet on a good bird. Wings should be short and well tucked up. Wings not tucked up are a fault often found in seemingly otherwise good birds. This is a breeding point that can be helped by careful selection. The tail is full and spreading at the base. The coverts sort of come up and help build up the tail while the feathers in the main tail come up and bend over to give that nice roundness without having to break the feathers to get it. Watch out for the pinch-tailed birds, as they will pop up most unexpectedly. The thighs are set moderately wide apart and well feathered. Those legs and toes must be well feathered right down to the tip of the middle toe. Legs and toes are yellow in color including the bottom of the feet. A bird with a vulture hock is not classed as a Cochin in this day and age.

A good Black Cochin is a pretty sight on the lawn and in the show pen. They do well small runs and are ideal for the city fancier.
