The whole issue is so political and counter productive. With that in mind, we need to make sure we talk to the appropriate people whenever we can. As a hobby, there may be times we need to cancel shows and gatherings as a way to protect

the poultry industry and our own birds as well. I don't know what I'd do if I lost all my birds at this point after investing 5 years in their development. We in the fancy don't want disease outbreaks any more than someone in the commercial industry. It's time to stand up and make our voices heard. Until next time, keep those champions growing!

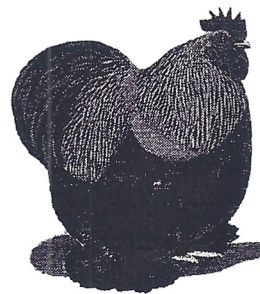

Custom Shampoo For Your Cochins

While I was on vacation this summer I had the opportunity to wash a couple Black Cochins. Since we are always on the lookout for a shampoo or soap that works well on our birds, and rinses out thoroughly I thought I would pass on to you my experience with "Show Shampoo" by Blue Ribbon Products. Don and Linda Park gave me a bottle to try and I told them I would write a little about their product if it worked well for me.

It comes in a easy to handle bottle and you don't have to use very much of it to get some real good suds. I followed the direction on the label and the birds rinsed out nicely. When they were dry there was absolutely no stringy feathers as is sometimes the case if you don't get all of the soap out of the tail feathers.

I was very happy with the results and will look for this shampoo again when I get back into breeding and showing. If anyone is interested in purchasing a bottle of "Show Shampoo" there is an ad on page 18 with contact information.

Blue Cochin Bantams

By C. L. Sibley, an excerpt from the book "Cochins Bantams"
This article was originally printed in the 1936 ABA Yearbook

...The Blues were first developed in England, but the English ideal calls for a clear and rather light blue color, without the darker lacing on each feather. American fanciers are working for a color similar to that of the best Blue Andalusians—blue ground color, bright and clear (not muddy or brownish), and the darker lacing distinct and as narrow as possible, without failing to follow the entire edge of the feather in an even, narrow band. The color is so great a part of the charm of the Blue Cochin that it should certainly have equal consideration until we get the color better fixed in the Blues.

Blue color in domestic poultry does not breed 100 percent true, but follows Mendel's Law. Thus, when blue males are mated to blue females, only 50 percent of the progeny will come blue; 25 percent will come black, and 25 percent will come with white grayish mottling, sometimes called splash-white. No matter how many generations are bred, so long as blue is mated to blue, only 50 percent of the progeny will come blue. On the other hand, if the black and the splash-white progeny from blues are mated together, the young from same will come 100 percent blue. Unfortunately, the young from the black and splash-white mating, while all come blue in color they do not have the fineness of color or lacing that can be attained by careful mating of blue to blue; so for the purpose of producing first class show specimens, we must continue the blue to blue matings in order to make progress in color and lacing.

For anyone who loves the intricacies of breeding, and is willing to devote some whole-hearted effort to careful mating and breeding, Blue Cochin Bantams (*or Large Fowl*) offer a choice in a variety where the field is still open for real advancement. And certainly no variety of the Cochin family is any more beautiful than a well-bred Blue. They're a mighty nice little chicken...

When the Blue Andalusian breeders once hit the lacing

trail there was no turning aside and there was no turning back. It took them a while to realize their whereabouts but once there, they were of one accord. Some put more zip into it than others did but all movement was in the same direction. There was full acclaim in the perfecting the Andalusian color.

A little before 1920 a Canadian fancier paid \$75 for an Andalusian cock he got from the central United States. The bird placed very high at the Guelph show, the great "Ontario" as the show was called. The competing fanciers were agreed that this was one of the very best Andalusians of his time. Some of his plumage was kept for the record. Compared with some of the best winners twenty years later the earlier bird was found to be not as sharp in the lacing

and not as clear in tone of blue, there being a slight tone of smokiness in his plumage. Within the passing time many birds had been imported from Great Britain. These birds had been well received in America.

The imported birds had a wider lacing; they were darker but even with the darker shade there was freedom from the faintly smoky tone. Not only did the imported birds have wider lacing but a darker shade clung to the inside of the lacing, diminishing in web interior with a degree of merging in the upper breast. It could not by any means be said that the darker shade was adopted without reservation. Judicious American breeders did make good use of it in producing a sharper lacing with a clearer ground color. There was not what could be called a sudden change but a gradual though progressive refinement and embellishment.

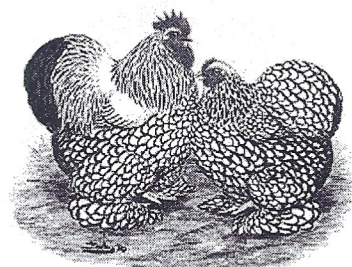
In that period of development a greater accuracy was imposed in demands of ideals. Up to then, in the male plumage, character had been expressed through a longer, tapering, and glossy flow of feather. The required surface color of the hackle, back, and wingbow sections had been a very dark and lustrous blue. This now was changed to provide a stripe in the middle of the web, to match the blue in the web of the other sections of the bird. The spread of lacing in those long, narrower, male sex-feathers covered the striping of those sections with much the same surface color as before. Nevertheless, the stripe was there and it was important. The change gave the breeder better choice in selecting his breeding males. The prepotency of light stripe with contrasting darker lacing was conducive to greater contrast in the progeny.

There was question about the exact shade of blue wanted in the ground color, a difficult question. Aaron Fell, a poultry authority of the time said "pigeon blue." That was the shade most suited to the color contrast objective. In the actual lacing the preference was for the darkest and sharpest. When it took on a greenish sheen the intensity was considered excessive. That still prevails.

The clarity of blue improves from year to year. The occasional black in a barb or part of a barb is detrimental. There is no provision for shaftiness in the quill. The longitudinal lacings in wings are especially difficult but rewarding. Every successful mating in a bloodline adds permanence, potency and prestige to that line of breeding. Freedom from black quills and black areas in the body of tail webs proper is evidence of thorough quality.

The above information applies equally to the large fowl as well as the bantam.

Blue Feathered Fowl Breeding

By Herbert H. Price
(American Bantam Association)

The author has reported his detailed results in making various blue feather matings over a period of some ten years in another volume. Some of the important facts may be summarized as follows:

The Blue-to-Blue mating. This is the ideal mating and the all-blue flock presents the most beautiful picture to the visitor. The first and second years of this mating is responsible for most of the prize winning Blue fowls in our shows. However, if this mating is used for three or more consecutive generations the progeny tends to come too dark to reveal lacing, and mottling with darker feathers may appear.

The Blue Splashed White fowl mated to Blue. This mating is necessary about every third year to prevent or correct the extreme darkness and mottling mentioned above. Splashed males mated to average colored blue hens gave progeny having a light enough shade that the lacing could not help being noticed. Several first prized pullets and hens that won additional awards for Best Laced and Best Colored came from this mating. The breeder must be warned however that any of the Splash matings must not be used more than two consecutive generations. It has been found that when a Blue out of one Splashed parent and also out of one Splashed grandparent is again mated to a Splash out of Splashed parent the progeny is frequently too light a blue to use for breeding or showing. In fact, a flock is recalled in which a Splashed ancestor on one side had been used in each generation for many years and the hens were as light on the neck as the breast and the males were too light in all top color. Any Splashed mating should be broken up as soon as hatching season is over, since the lack of uniformity in the flock is unpleasant to see and causes visitors to question why your blue flock is mixed up with speckled birds.

The Blue Splashed White to Black of Blue parentage mating. This is the mating desirable for the fancier who is in a hurry to raise a large number of blue fowls. Whether the Splashed sex used is male or the reverse, the progeny will be 100% blue chicks. This mating has been found to produce a sad lack of uniformity in blue coloring in the same hatch, as individuals range from light blue to dark shades and some are mottled with darker blue feathers. Fewer birds of exhibition quality are raised from this mating than from either of the two mating mentioned above.

The Blue-to-Black of blue parentage mating. Chicks from this mating proved darker than from the above Splash crosses and were poorly laced. Some looked black until at the age of 6 months they came out a darker blue. The 50% black chicks from this mating must be considered as wasters unless used to cross with the Splashed White. Adult Blacks of blue blood usually mature with a purplish iridescent sheen instead of the green sheen of true exhibition blacks. So these black wasters should never be bred as blacks, as the purple sheen would show up for many generations. Males from this mating were more prone to develop "rust" on the neck and back than the other matings above.

Purebred Blacks mated to Blues or Blue Splashed Whites. This mating is frequently used to improve a lack of type, head points, breadth of feather, or tail details. It was found best to have the male on the Blue side. Here again the chicks lacked

uniformity in color in the blues. This is a hazardous mating as it acts like out-crossing unrelated stock and this produces a great swarm of dominal autosomal genes that have been carried dormant for generations but are now unleashed, and anatomical faults appear. One must take off large hatches from this mating to be sure of raising a perfect specimen, but that one perfect blue fowl would be worth the season's time and trouble.

The pure recessive White mated to Black out of blue parents. This mating is not recommended for reasons to be shown. The recessive White without blue blood if mated to Blues would react in the same manner. When the author crossed Black of blue parentage with purebred recessive White of the same breed as mentioned in section "F" of Chapter IV, a hatch of 100% blue chicks was expected. But the progeny was equally divided between Blue and Black chicks. The resultant 50% blue chicks were too light to be used as exhibition specimens, and many of the blacks possessed large white areas. When these F1 blues were crossed with each other, the F2 progeny contained the ratio of: 2 solid whites to 4 normal blues to 1 black. No splash chick was hatched. These solid Whites were exactly like their white grandparents, and would breed true whites if crossed. The male tails of all were faulty as compared with the original blue stock.

When Wm. Huey crossed a black male having white patches with blue hens of the same variety, instead of getting the expected blue or/and black chicks, he hatched Whites slightly splashed with blue, but predominately white. One of these blue splashed White F1 males was crossed to pure blue hens and the hatch resulted in the ratio of: 25% blue to 50% blue splashed whites to 25% blanks. An equal number of blues and splashes would genetically be expected. This Black male with the white areas undoubtedly carried dormant genes from a pure white ancestor. Which calls attention to the fact that when crossing blues with purebred Blacks or Whites, one must be sure that they are from a long line of pure stock.

The Blue Splashed White crossed with Blue Splashed Whites. This of course gives 100% white progeny more or less splashed with blue. This mating is mentioned because several Blue Rose comb fanciers are advocating breeding the Blue Splashed White as a distinct variety of Rosecombs. The difficulty lies in the lack of uniformity of the blue ticking on the white, as no two birds are marked alike. The blue splashes range from one or two nickel-sized blue spots to large irregular blue patches that cover half of the surface. Also breeding the Splash-to-Splash over a period of years will cause them to return to solid whites. They must occasionally be crossed with blue stock to increase the number and size of the blue splashes. There are many uses for the Splashed individual as are shown in the various matings above. They are used to rapidly multiply a blue flock, to obtain better lacing, to obtain better type, and a male can be used to head a pen of females containing: Blue, Black, or Black of blue parentage.

In England about 1935 on the suggestion of Dutch Geneticist Dr. Hagedoorn, the blue splashed White cockerels of a hatch of large Blue Leghorns were mated to a large flock of high egg

production Black Leghorns of the large order. This resulted in large hatches of 100% Blue Leghorns. Blue Leghorn Bantams can easily be produced from mating a blue splashed White Blue Andalusian bantam male to S.C. Black Leghorn bantams females.

Perhaps some helpful suggestions may be obtained from considering how the breeders of large Blue breeds of fowls operate. One of America's largest dealers in Rare breeds of domestic fowl and bantams advises customers in his catalogue that Blue Andalusians can be mated in any one of three ways:

1. Blue to Blues,
2. Blue males to Blue, Splashed White and Black females of blue parentage,
3. Black males of blue blood to Blue and Splashed White females.

But he reminds customers that in any one of these matings the breeder must expect a certain percentage of black and white splashed chicks in addition to blues.

The Blue Andalusian Club of America has advocated the following matings to its members:

- A. Standard exhibition colored Blues of each sex.
- B. A heavily laced dark blue male to light blue females with or without lacing.
- C. A light blue male to well laced dark blue females.
- D. A Black male of blue blood to Blue Splashed White females.
- E. The reverse of D.

They noted that the dark well-laced male was most likely to give good color to the offspring.

Another Blue Andalusian breeder of that date cautioned that the blue males from a black to splashed white mating were likely to give offspring without lacing. Some Andalusian breeders were using Double-Mating methods, but the Andalusian Club article failed to mention this procedure.

Blue coloring varies from year to year in a single bird, just as it does in the progeny of a single mating. The Feathered World reported a case of a first prize Blue cockerel that molted out so faultily that he could not be shown the next year as a cock. However. The same bird as a three year old molted out as perfectly as he had been as a cockerel and then won the First Cock prize.

One writer called attention to the fact that breeding no mat-

ings except blue-to-blue year after year, eventually caused the blue coloring to either fade to lighter shades or to darken until it approached black. But a Splashed white to black of blue parentage brought out a fresh rich blue color. Also a dark blue crossed with the Splash, or a light blue mated to black gives the same rich medium shade of blue.

It must not be forgotten by the breeder of blues that among nearly all breeds it is the Black variety that has the best type and size of any in the breed. If the breeder wishes to improve type of his blue variety, and in bantams to get smaller size, he should try crossing his blues with the black variety of his breed. The British author had this in mind when he wrote that in his country breeders of both Old English and Modern Game bantams often use the mating of a black cock with their blue hens, or they run extra pure Black hens with their blue-to-blue matings.

The fancier need ONLY ONE Blue fowl of the laced-blue class to start a flock of blue chickens. That one may be either a solid blue or a blue splashed white of blue parents. For instance, if the breeder has a single Blue Rosecomb, possibly the only chick raised from a setting of eggs, he must next obtain either another blue, or a blue splashed white, or a Black Rosecomb of the sex needed. This Black need not have any blue blood. In any one of these three matings he can expect to hatch 50% blue chicks. Or suppose he has a splashed white male, he now needs one or more black females of that breed having excellent type and size. From this last mating all chicks will be blue in color.

If the breeder possesses a single blue fowl and wishes to breed blues of that variety, he must first make doubly certain which class of blue coloring his bird carries. The laced blue and the non-laced blues cannot be mixed as discussed above. Many European fanciers breed both laced-blue and non-laced blue varieties in many breeds, and some have been imported into this country in the past. If this single blue is a laced-blue he will usually show traces of darker blue around body feathers, especially the breast and wing bars. If lacing can not be found on the edges of these feathers, even a poorly marked specimen of laced blue will have darker hackles in both sexes and the male saddle feathers will be much darker than the breast. If this blue fowl has no lacing and its hackle and saddle feathers are the same color as the body, the owner is in possession of a non-laced blue of the Belgian type, or a worthless laced-blue bird. The many ways that this one blue fowl may be mated to produce a blue flock are discussed above in this chapter or in chapter IV.
