

Letter to the Editor: U.S. Postal Service shipping of Poultry and Chicks (from Pat Lacey)

Dear Poultry Friends,

I have received Emails and phone calls from folks having a great concern that the United States Postal Service will be discontinuing the service of shipping our birds and chicks. I put my husband on it. He has worked for the Postal Service for 34 years and is the Postmaster in Neillsville. THERE WILL BE NO CHANGES IN THE SHIPPING OF BIRDS AND CHICKS!!!...This all got started when Federal Express and the Postal Service began negotiating a contract between the two organizations. Federal Express refuses to ship live birds. The Postal Service said that was fine. The Postal Service will STILL HANDLE BIRDS through its regular air transportation system and other multiple options they have to transport mail.

They also advised my husband, that all mailers such as McMurray and Stromberg should be receiving a letter from the Headquarters of the United States Postal Service stating that there have been no changes and that they will still be accepting for shipment the type of birds that we have shipped in the past. We still need to use our heads and not be shipping birds in the hot months of the year. I tell my customers I do not ship until after October 15th. We, as a body, create a great deal of revenue for the Postal

Service and in return they do a great job for us. Looking forward to the fall Poultry Shows and seeing many of you. Your Friend in the Fancy...Pat Lacey

Additionally in a later email......Dear Tom.....Mike received an inner office memo reaffirming the information that I sent to you. The Postal Service is now attempting to locate poultry shippers, even small ones like me, to try to get them this "letter" stating that none of the regulations of shipping poultry has changed. McMurray just has not received it. As often, good does come out of bad, and as this fear swept the US, many contacts were received by the Postal Service, as well as senators as seem in the McMurray undertaking. We create revenue...shipping of poultry goes back to the beginning of the U.S. Post Office. For now, we can rest easy.

Editor's Note: I myself got involved with this whole situation when I received and email stating the shipping of day old chicks was in jeopardy. I filled out an automated form via the email that Murray McMurray had set up, which was then forwarded to the appropriate offices at Capital Hill. I received emails back from the offices of Senator Jesse Helms and Congressman Walter B. Jones. Strength is in numbers and the commercial hatcheries do a lot of business that benefits the poultry hobbyists in the long run. These hatcheries are where many of today's top breeders got their starts.

West Central District Update:

Greetings from the West Central District -

Things have been really warm here in the upper mid-west so far in July, we were cool and wet in June with twice the normal rainfall and when the season changed we went hot and dry with July now being one of the driest on record they say. The weather is kind of like raising chickens, if you just hang in there the dry spell won't last too long.

This is my favorite time of year watching all things in nature grow and bloom and like in nature you have to tend to the weeds you also have to weed the birds from your flocks that don't meet your expectations. Some times this is a difficult and time consuming task but it may be the most important job you can do all year short of setting up your breeding pens. Culling out those poorer birds cuts down on the feed bill, gives the remaining birds more space so they will do better and rids you of the bird that catches your eye when you walk into the yard but has a defect that makes him not good enough for the showroom or the breeding pen. Getting rid of this bird or birds removes the temptation to keep him around a little longer hoping he will change when in reality most likely he won't. This past weekend I culled about 25 Large Buff Cochins and 18 Buff Cochin Bantams from my young bird flock. I originally started the spring growing season with 74 Large Buffs and 60 Bantam Buffs so will still have a good selection of young birds to pick from.

As the summer fair season starts up get out to your local fair, state fair or local show and exhibit some of your cochins, it will spark enthusiasm in yourself and the public who will see your birds and there is no better way to compare the good points and bad points of your birds than comparing them to others.

First of all I would like to welcome William Lewis to our area. Hope to see you at the local shows.

I have placed my District Meet for 2001 at the Forsyth Fowl Fanciers on November 24, 2001. That is one week after the National in Richmond. I will be there and hope you all are too.

Just about the time you think you know a little, BOOM. Something you have not gone through hits. This year for the first time I have a lot of cannibalism in my Cochins. I have had 5 killed and several maimed. I sort of expect the White Crested Polish to peck topknots, as they seem to do that. The White Crested seem to peck more than the Buff Laced The ironic thing that I have found is that several of the same breeding have been picked and always on the elbow part of the right wing. They take it to the bone. At one point I put rings in the noses out of frustration. I don't like to do this as the bottom beak grows longer than the top, but I could not handle the bloody babies. I don't have a large flock of birds so I pretty well know many of the breedings by certain features that the mother produces. It upsets me to see this

This is the time of the year that I'm not too fond of. The young birds are in the teenage stage and the adults are going into moult. Another month or two and they will start blooming, hopefully. I have found that when I showed dogs and with the chickens, they look like gawky things you don't know if you want to continue to feed and then all of a sudden they bloom. That's when you know why you did all the work.

I would like to publicly thank the people that sold me birds that now make up my breeding program. First of all my Mentor and Special Friend, George Priest. I have his stock in my Polish also. I then added some stock from John Henderson. I bought a mottled hen from Elton Minnich at the 1998 show at Columbus. I had only black to breed her to and got all black, carrying mottle. A daughter from that breeding won Ch. Asiatic at the ABA National at Lake City in 2000, 3150 birds. I used the birds from these three sources and have been very happy with the breedings. To these three men, I say THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

Something I think we all need to pay attention to and that is our Junior Exhibitors. They are the lifelines of our hobby. I don't believe that they should have their chickens taken care of by the parents or caregivers. Taking care of their own I would think would make a win have much more meaningful. It will also teach them skills for life, such as, you get out what you put in, NO MORE, NO LESS. Selling these Juniors inferior birds will kill their interest and they will be gone. I don't believe in giving away birds to the Juniors either, as I don't think they are appreciated as much. Try to help one of these little guys or gals and watch the smiles on their faces, it's all worth it. I had an experience at a show last year. A very enthusiastic young girl inquired who I was as she had spotted a polish pullet I had there. It was the fourth place pullet. I asked her, why don't you want the one that went 1st or 2nd. She said, because I like this one better. I was amazed, as she was totally correct. The bird was not a cheap bird and she promised her mom she would do chores, not complain, etc. At the end of the show, I gave her a cockerel. I saw the birds she already had and couldn't bear to see that pretty pullet bred to those cock birds. She was thrilled and she will probably beat the socks off me this year. I would get a big kick out of that.

I am very pleased with the results so far. Out of 20 I kept 5 pullets, and 3 males. The pullets are of good type and they are growing faster than the white pullets. The males have perfect yellow legs, showing no dark or willow coloring. It will be interesting to see how they finish up.

In October of 2000, Paul and Troy put on the APA National Meet with about 3000 entries. The Cochins were very well represented. It was nice to see Bill Ryan with his Black and Blue Large Cochins. Large Whites were a large class. Also, congratulations to Paul on his Large Buff cockerel. His first time showing his Buffs. This was a fun filled show. Joe Mazur topped the Cochins with his beautiful Black Bantam Pullet. She now resides with me and we named her Joesey. She is a real sweetheart. Thanks to Paul and Troy for a well run and organized show.

tams.

- 1984 crossed in a buff cochin bantam female with no success. Better might have been buff columbian.
- 1985 crossed in a red cochin bantam female.
- 1986 crossed in a buff columbian male with a lot of white, from this cock 84 sons and daughters and 259 grandsons and daughters were bred.
- 1987 and 1990 milles fleures booted bantam and porcelain (Jubilee) orpington bantams were crossed in. This gave great problems in shape and the color didn't become better. Ground color varied from light buff till dark brown. In these years also some partridge was brought in, but this gamacolor gave many problems.
- 1991 a mottled hen and a buff cock with colored markings were brought in.
- 1993 from these animals the first cockerel was ready for showing.
- Until the moment they were recognized 1883 chicks were bred.

NOTE: The color of the foot feathers is not like in booted bantam. The feathers are brown with black and white markings. 1994,1995 and 1996 they were showed and judged and in 1997 they were recognized.

At this moment, 2001, porcelain cochin bantams are in Germany, Holland and Belgium in a good quality. The youngest color could use some more breeders to help to give them the finishing touch.

Letter to the Editor: (From Pat Lacey)

Dear Tom and Cochin International members:

First off we need to welcome Tom back home. In light of recent international negotiations, we need to be thankful for the men and women who serve this great nation.

I feel I need to address an issue that many of you may not be aware of unless you thoroughly read your APA quarterly newsletters. The subject is judges showing and judging at the same poultry show. The APA included in its newsletter 2 years ago a survey sheet asking the membership their feelings on this issue. It had an overwhelming response, with 70% being against judges showing and judging. An amendment to the bylaws was created (only directors vote on bylaw changes) banning judges from judging and showing, except in an emergency situation. This was voted upon at Boston, then again at Utah (supposedly enough time had not been given), then again in Ontario and once more last month at the Semi annual in Wapakoneta, Ohio, again passing but by the narrowest margin yet.

My concerns is that the APA is ignoring the wishes of it's membership. They have now chosen to define "emergency". The wiggle room here would be almost funny if this wasn't such an important issue.

Here is the language to be voted upon at Nebraska....Article VII Section 1 paragraph f (change to read:) { Judges shall not be allowed to judge and show at any APA sanctioned meet except in an emergency situation. An emergency exits when a judge listed in the show catalog cancels after the entry deadline has passed, when the number of entries indicate an additional judge(s) should be added, or when a judge cannot complete his/her assignment during a show. In this event, any judge shall never judge in any class in which he or she is competing and shall not participate in voting to pick champions.}

Now folks, this language is very broad and gives any show who wants to allow judges to show and judge the opportunity to hire x number of judges...advertise those judges...then after entries close hire additional judges and they may show and judge.

If a bird owned by one of the judges becomes a class champion, he may not participate in the final judging of champion row. This means he is not up there promoting YOUR bird that he made a class champion!

No other animal exhibition industry allows a judge to also show at the same competition. It is time for the exhibitor to speak up. WE are the industry and our wishes should be their foremost concern.

CONSTITUTION OF COCHINS INTERNATIONAL

June 6, 1994

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this organization shall be Cochins International, a non-profit corporation.

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE

The purpose of the Association shall be to promote, encourage and foster the development of the Cochin breed, both bantams and large fowl.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Any person or organization in sympathy with the objectives of this Association is eligible for membership.

ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS

The officers of the Association shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary. Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, and District Directors (all which make up the Board of Directors and Budget committee). These officers shall have full discretion and decision in any and all non-constitutional questions that may arise, except as limited in the By-Laws and vote of the membership. They shall be elected in the manner and for the terms herein after specified in the By-Laws.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

The President, as deemed necessary, shall call the regular meetings and/or special meetings of this organization.

ARTICLE VII. SHOWS

There will be two NATIONAL SHOWS a year, one Eastern and one Western. Shows are separated primarily by the Mississippi River and will allow for three Eastern and three Western Districts. An attempt will be made to place National Shows on a rotational basis by districts. To be considered, the national show must guarantee at least one hundred (100) Cochins in the show. In the event of multiple requests for the National Show, it shall be awarded to the show offering the most specials and awards. The quality of the building will also be considered. DISTRICT and REGIONAL SHOWS, will be placed by the respective District Directors; with district shows placed on a rotational basis. All clubs that request a meet will be issued a Regional Meet if not a District or National Show. This request originates from representatives of the various clubs.

ARTICLE VIII. MASTER BREEDER AND MERIT AWARD

Master breeder points will be allowed for all seventeen (17) colors of cochins and points can only be gained within the breed. The program is based on one point for every five birds shown providing there are two or more exhibitors showing. The ultimate goal is 500 points in not less than five years in any one variety. A MERIT AWARD will be given for the first 100 points in each variety. Membership must be current to qualify for Master Breeder points, and if an individual has lapse membership for three months or more the points will be removed from the records.

ARTICLE IX. AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the Constitution and to the By-Laws may be initiated by a 2/3 vote of the members present at any regular meeting of the Association provided the amendment(s) was presented one month in advance by mail and the entire membership must be notified at the time of ratification.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE 1. MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

SECTION 1. Membership is open to any Cochin enthusiast who is willing to abide with the Constitution and By-laws.

SECTION 2. Active membership in the Association include:

- Regular single membership
- Family membership
- 3. Junior membership (17 years old and younger)

SECTION 3. Members in good standing have the voting privileges of one vote per membership.

SECTION 4. Memberships run from January 1st to December 31st of each year and are payable in advance. Dues are considered delinquent on February 1st.

SECTION 5. The business and fiscal year of the Association shall be the normal fiscal year; January 1st to December 31st.

ARTICLE II. OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

SECTION 1. The officers of this Association shall be elected by mail-in vote on or before November 1st of the current year and the officers will take office on January 1st of the following year. Officers shall hold office for a period of one year and shall be eligible for reelection.

AMENDMENT 3. 30 November, 2000 – Officers and Directors terms of office changed to two years. Passed by majority votes at both Eastern and Western National meets. This change will take effect for the 2001 elections. All other rules governing Article II Section 1 of the By-Laws still apply.

SECTION 2. The Board of Directors shall be composed of the current officers, and immediate past president.

SECTION 3. A Majority of the Officers and Director present at any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 4. In the event of the death or resignation of any officer or director, the vacancy shall be immediately filled by the vote of the remaining members of the Board of Directors to finish out the unexpired term.

ARTICLE III. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION I. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Association, and shall preside at all meetings of the Association, and during this term of office shall be charged with the general supervision of the affairs of the Association. The President shall appoint a committee of three to nominate officers for the following year. Nominations will also be received from the general Membership. The President will also write an article for each newsletter.

SECTION 2. The Vice-President shall take on the duties of the President in the absence of that officer.

SECTION 3. The Secretary shall keep the regular written records of the Association. S/He shall be responsible for issuing notices of all Meetings and keep a running account of the Master Breeder Points.

SECTION 4. The Assistant Secretary will be the editor for the Cochin News and have this publication published three times a year.

SECTION 5. The Treasurer shall receive, keep safe and account for all Monies and securities of the Association, keeping same in a special account in the name of the Association. S/He shall disburse money at the direction of the President. In the event of the termination of the Association, the treasurer (or any officer signing on the checking account) shall initiate the following process. The Treasurer (or officer) shall call a meeting of the Board of Directors to determine the fate of the assets. Any number remaining in the Board of Directors will constitute a quorum. In the event no Board of Directors are located, the Treasurer will dispose of the assets by donating assets to a non-profit organization(s) after two years of inactivity of the organization.

SECTION 6. The District Directors will include representatives from the six United States districts and one International district. These directors will place all meets in their respective districts, with the excep-

tion of the national(s). The districts include: NORTH EAST (ME, VT, NH, NY, HA, CT, RI, PA, DE, MD, NJ, VA, and WV), SOUTH EAST (TN. NC, SC, MS, AL, GA, and FL),

NC; 3C; M3; AL; OT, and LD; NORTH EAST CENTRAL (WI, IL, IN, MI, OH, and KT), SOUTHWEST (CO, KS, MO, OK, AR, LA, TX, and NM), NORTH WEST CENTRAL (MT, ND, SD, WY, NE, MN, and IA), AMENDMENT 1: 30 January 1996 – Northeast District Divided up into Northeast I and Northeast II. Passed by majority vote. They will bid as one district for National meets as to not extend the rotation. Additionally, the number of District Directors is now eight.

PACIFIC (WA, OR, ID, CA, NV, UT, AZ, AK, and HI), and INTERNATIONAL (Canada, Europe, and all other countries)

ARTICLE IV. COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. Committees may be appointed as needed by the President.

SECTION 2. The Budget Committee will be a standing committee and include the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, District Representatives and past President.

ARTICLE V. NATIONAL MEET

The National Meets (one Eastern and one Western per year) will be placed by the votes of the District Directors, and Officers for a total of thirteen (President, Vice-President, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer and past President). In the event a member holds two offices there will only be one vote allowed. The President of Cochins International must receive national bids by July 30th for consideration for the following year.

AMENDMENT 2: 30 January 1996 - Subsequent to change 1, the total votes of the Officers and Directors now numbers 14.



Buff Color

Where to begin is a question in itself. So I will give some background on myself and any qualifications that I have a right to pen this article. My first fowls that I raised as a young man were Large Partridge Cochins. I worked with them for about four years. Somewhere along the way these birds picked up Pullorum Typhoid and as nice as they were they had to be destroyed. So went my career with Partridge Cochins.

Liking the Cochin Breed itself, I next was able to secure Large Buff Cochin chicks from Arthur Manly in Fresno, CA. This was in the spring of 1968. So I started my journey with Buff colored fowl. We should back up here just a minute and as a foot note say that Arthur Manly was a good friend of Marcus Davidson of Bath, PA. He secured his breeding stock from Davidson.

Marcus Davidson was the foremost breeder of the buff colored birds in the U.S.A. at that time. In my opinion probably the greatest breeder of buff colored birds we will ever have. On his farm he raised all Buff colors of birds: Cochins, Orpingtons, Rocks, Leghorns and Minorcas. My first trip to his farm was in the early 1970's. At that time Marcus was in his late seventies and had primarily Large and Bantam Buff Cochins, Buff Leghorns and a few Buff Rocks. Upon our visit we discussed, at length, buff colors. From the seminar he was conducting for my benefit, I obtained as much information as I could. Marcus Davidson was a very humble person and was totally unselfish

with any information that he could convey that would help me with my breeding program.

Here is what Marcus Davidson told me about buff color and since that time it has been my goal in trying to breed good buff color. The shade of buff that you desire to reproduce doesn't make any difference whether it's a light shade of buff or a darker shade of buff as long as it's even. By even I mean the hackle, the breast, the saddle and under fluff. As for the under fluff or under color the lighter the surface color, the lighter the shade of under color will be, the darker the surface color, the darker the under color will need to be. Under color will be the hardest to keep in the hackle, as it always wants to get lighter in that area.

It has been my experience that the darker your shade of buff becomes the more pepper you will get in the tails of the females, and the males can get to the point where they will get solid black tail feathers. In these birds you will more than likely have outstanding under color good right to the skin. This is true even in the hackle area, which we said was hard to achieve. On the whole these birds for the most part will be too dark a shade of buff bordering on reddish, especially in the males. The females however may be useful if you are trying to darken your birds in buff color. I will say here that in a breeding female with good body type I'm not afraid to use one with some pepper in her tail feathers as I think it helps with the under color. But for show

This issue's "PULLETzer" Prize Winning Recipe

YUMMY CHICKEN WITH BROWN GRAVY

Submitted by: John Thyssen



Ingredients:

1 Whole Chicken (Cut up)
2 tsp Dry Mustard
1 cup Flour
1 tbsp Worchester Sauce
1 tsp Paprika
1 tbsp Onion Powder
1 tsp Salt
1/2 tsp Baking Soda
1/4 tsp pepper
1/4 lb Butter



Remove giblets from chicken and boil in 2 cups of water. Season with Salt, Pepper and Garlic to taste. Set aside.

Combine in a Shake Bag or Large Zip-Loc bag:

1 cup Flour

1 tsp Paprika

1 tsp Salt

1/4 tsp Pepper

Melt 1/4 lb of butter in a frying pan. Shake chicken in bag with flour mix and brown. Retain butter.

Place browned chicken in a 2 and a half to 3 quart oven pan. Cut up giblets and add to chicken. In the frying pan that was used to brown the chicken add to the butter the following:

2 tsp Dry Mustard

1 tbsp Worchester Sauce

1 tbsp Powdered Onion

1/2 tsp Baking Soda

Blend ingredients and bring to a light simmer. Remove from heat and pour over the chicken.

Bake at 350 degrees for approximately 1 hour and 10 minutes.

Serve the gravy over boiled potatoes.

Cochins: Quality better than ever! By Pat Lacey

In recent issues of Poultry Press there has been quite the discussion of wing carriage in bantam cochins. Since I spend most of my time in the Cochin aisle, I would like to share my observations.

The wing of a Cochin needs to have short blunt primaries. If the primaries are to long, not only do they stick out in back and destroy the overall conformation, they tend to make the wings in the males sag. A Cochin wing, whether male or female, needs to snap back when pulled away from their body or again the males cannot hold them up. We also ask our cochins to "show" when judged. The males naturally place their wings down into the "drag them in front of the females" position to twist and turn around the cage. If you wish to see the wing carriage raised, the bird needs to be allowed to return to a relaxed position. If we raise our bantam cochins to be to large they tend to stand more upright in the cages and the wings of the males point to the floor. Notice in every instance I refer to wing carriage problems in (some not all) male cochins but NOT in female cochins. If you walk the Cochin aisle you will see 90% of the females have proper wing carriage.

I tend to be more concerned with the size and conformation of the Cochin we raise. A Cochin is not to be a "basket ball" of feathers with no definition. The APA Standard of Perfection directs "shape"...

a short well arched neck...meeting a short back...(old timers say an egg should be able to sit sideward in the curve of the short back. The hackle should not reach into the cushion.)...with a cushion rising at the base of the hackle...well rounded with plumage flowing over wings well into the thigh plumage...back very broad...breast carried low, well rounded of great breadth and depth...legs set well apart (this helps to keep the birds from standing erect. When looking at the Standard's illustrations, the head is even with the cushion, not higher that the cushion.)... fluff, soft, full, abundant, deep, well rounded from point of the breast to abdomen, well let down between legs...and wings, small well up and well folded. Weight is another issue with amounts from 26 oz to 32 oz (about a pound and ½ of butter to 2 pounds of butter). Bigger does not make a better Cochin.

I don't equate number of Cochins shown to quality. Any bird in any poultry show has to stand and be judged upon its own merits. OK. I'm a researcher by trade. Lets see how the cochins are doing. The ABA &APA 2000 year books shows 38 cochins as either champion or reserve champion bantam... (Hmmm, not bad). The APA lists 22 folks as Master Breeders of a Cochin variety, (100 points in one color), and the ABA 17 Master Breeders of a Cochin variety (20 starred wins). Now more than ever, there is quality in many breeders birds not just one prominent breeder. Every one is raising cochins capable of winning. That's what makes the Cochin aisle so much fun.

purposes she would be discounted for this.

Now on the other hand if your birds are a lighter shade of buff you will need to guard against the opposite of pepper in the tails. This will be light under color and signs of white in the primaries and toe feathering in Cochins. In Plymouth Rocks I've found with the light color Buff you also tend to lose leg color with this light surface color. You will also usually have poorer eye color, particularly in the females, but will eliminate the pepper in the tails, especially in the males.

When breeding the lighter shade of buff pay close attention to the quill color in the primaries. Use birds that have as good a buff quill as possible. This I have found will also help hold your buff color and keep the white out of the primaries. I've listed some things to watch for with both the darker shades and lighter shades of buff. Ideally a good medium shade would be perfect, but this is where the challenge comes in trying to keep your medium ideal buff color. My experience has been that it's easier to lighten the color than darken the color, especially with females.


I've had even more trouble with Buff Plymouth Rock Females holding their color. It may be because they lay eggs at a younger age than the Cochin Females do. From whichever shade of buff color you choose to breed, be careful not to breed from too much of an extreme color difference. By doing this you will probably be all right with the males but the females will be mealy. Their color won't be a nice even shade of buff. Instead will look dusted with cornstarch or flour. To avoid this we need to go with only small color differences when trying to make your shade of buff a little darker or lighter. I think this keeps the shafting out of the feathers also. Shafting once you get it is hard to get rid of, so I always select away from it if possible.

This may be the place to mention that shade from the sun will help keep the buff color that you've bred. When I visited Marcus Davidson all those years ago I thought his place somewhat overgrown with tall "horse weeds," we call them, about 8 feet tall and big wide leaves. It looked overgrown, but that was the idea. They made a perfect sunshade and his buff colored birds were a beautiful even shade of buff color. How he ever caught a bird in that tangle I never figured out, but they had great color. So some good shade will help you keep the evenness of color, especially in the females, as they seem to bleach out the most from too much exposure to the sun. Here again I think it's compounded when they are laying eggs, as not only do they lose skin pigment and eye color, they also lose some feather color.

I've come to the conclusion in my 25 plus years of breeding buff colored birds that if it was that easy to do, more people would breed buff colored birds and the color would be more popular.

I like all colors of birds. But even if I'm partial to buff colored birds, I think that I've come to appreciate a good colored bird even more over the years as I learned the complexities and difficulties of breeding a colored bird.

In closing I hope that I've answered some of the questions surrounding buff color that you may have had. I tried to keep with some of the basic things that I look for and personal experiences that I've had breeding the buff colored birds. Nothing beats some trial and error. After all these years every year is still a learning experience for me. Some years you take two steps forward and the next year one backward. It just takes determination on your part to reach that elusive goal of the perfect type bird and the color you have been striving for.

Showing White Cochin Bantams

By Edward G. Hanson Originally printed in the 1921 ABA Yearbook

When I go to a poultry show there is one exhibit I look forward to with a great deal of pleasure, and that exhibit is the White Cochin Bantam class. There seems to be a certain fascination to me, to watch the small snowy white birds, and I am sure that there are many other breeders who will agree with me in saying that the most beautiful of all the poultry family is the little "White Cochin Bantam." But the sad fact is that many a time one can see a class of these birds which are not worthy the entry fee at the time they are being shown, merely because of the lack of energy on the part of the exhibitor in preparing the birds in the proper manner.

In preparing show birds I begin as soon as the bird is hatched, by doing all in my power to make them comfortable and contented. I go around my birds and pet them and do other things to make them accustomed to the presence of people. There is nothing in my estimation that is so disgusting as to see a bird that would otherwise win the blue ribbon had it not been so wild and frightened when the judge looks it over. Many a bantam has lost the ribbon for no other reason than he was not "tame."

About six or eight weeks before the show I go over my flock carefully and pull out all broken feathers, and put the bantams in small covered runs with a sand floor. This is to keep the new feathers from breaking. I also examine the feet and legs of the birds and see that they are smooth and clean. In case they are the least bit rough, I apply a few applications of carbolic vaseline, which tends to soften and clean them of any scaliness.

Three weeks before the show I transfer them to exhibition coops where I teach them to pose and stand in any position that I think suitable to bring out their good points. I find that it is best to do this training at night, as they are not so liable to get frightened. From this time on until two days before the show, I coach them and try to get them accustomed to being on exhibition.

Two days before the show I wash them. This is, perhaps, really the most important and yet most difficult part of conditioning the birds. It requires a great amount of patience and must be done thoroughly in order to be worth the trouble. They are washed as follows: I first prepare three tubs. The first tub of water is quite warm

and this is the one in which I put my suds. In washing I use Ivory soap as it floats and is, therefore, handy at all times. I make a good lather and first wash the comb, face and wattles. When this is done the feet are next. When washing the feet my motto is "be thorough" as it is very important to have the feet in as good a condition as possible. I use a fine tooth brush and make sure I get all the dirt from under the scales. A toothpick is very good for this and not hard to obtain. When this is done, place the bird in the water, with only its head above the water, holding him so until thoroughly soaked. Wash him thoroughly and be careful at all times to rub the way the feathers grow so as not to break them. Next comes tub number two. This is to get the soap out of the feathers. It should be in temperature and the bird nee only to be put in and the feathers rinsed enough to get the soap out. Then comes tub number three. In this tub the bird is given the finishing touches. This water should just have the chill taken out and a little blueing added. Just a trifle as it adds to the coloring of the white bird. Too much, however, will spoil the effect. When this is done, the bird is taken out of the water, and sponged so as to dry as much as possible. Then wrap in a Turkish towel and set it before the fire and let it rest. Then comes the drying. Some people think it is necessary to set them before the fire and let them dry. This will do, but for the best results have an electric fan that you can use to blow the warm air on the bird and while the bird is drying keep working the feathers all the time to make them more fluffy. If an electric heater is available, it will prove a great aid in the drying process.

In taking to the show, if the show is in the immediate neighborhood, it is best to put as few as possible in each crate as this will diminish the chance of their breaking feathers or getting dirty. If they are shipped, then it may be necessary to place them all in one crate. It is best by all means to keep the show birds separated in the shipping crate by cloth partitions. By following the above simple directions you should not have to place a poorly conditioned bantam in the show room.

Last Minute Item of Interest:
