MSPA is offering \$250.00 in cash as well as plaques for Best and Reserve of Breed in Large and Bantam Cochins.


#### **Eastern National**

#### President's Notes:

Hello from sunny California,

As you all are probably aware, in addition to being the newsletter editor, I am the new club President and so, I will roll my President's article and Editorial all into one column.

The first thing I would like to do is congratulate our new Vice-president, Charles Anderson, and our two new District Directors, Tim Baldwin and Kim Aldrich, as they take over their new positions as a result of our recent elections. Additionally important is a note of thanks for their service to the club, to John Thyssen, Dave West, Dawn Ware, and Scott Adams as they leave their posts. If you see them at a show, be sure to pass on your thanks as well. Without the efforts of our Officers and Directors, and our members, the club would not exist so if there is something that the club could do better or that you would like to bring up, feel free to drop me a note! This is a breed club and our main focus is obviously Cochins, but we are part of the much larger poultry fancy. With that in mind it is my opinion that we share a duty to be the stewards of our breed and ensure that we adhere to the standards as they are written, and take Cochins in a direction that is in the best interest of standard bred poultry. We have many varieties of Cochins that require significant breeding work to bring them closer to the prescribed Cochin characteristics and there are other varieties out there yet to be seen. It is nice to see is that Large Cochins are becoming more popular. Their numbers had fallen off for a while, and I am seeing more and more names associated with Large Cochins!! That bodes well for our breed!

I was writing an email the other night and I mentioned in it that I saw myself a student of Cochins. I think that I would me more accurate in stating that I am a student of the fancy, and I am always on the lookout for poultry information of interest. Photos and artwork are one of the things I am always searching for, but I also try and find as much information regarding breeding and genetics as they relate to color crosses and varieties. I just recently purchased a book on Orpingtons by J. Batty. I bought it from someone in England so and I haven't received it yet, but I am hoping for some good reading!

I do a little historical digging now and then and I procured a copy of the 1924 ABA Yearbook several years ago. I was thumbing through it the other day and noted a significant amount of the ads being for Cochins so that prompted me to do a comparison of how the Cochin ads stacked up compared to the other ads in the yearbook. The 1924 ABA Yearbook contained 93 pages and included a total of 167 advertisements. Of these ads, 77 were for Cochin Bantams. These 77 ads contained 51 references to Blacks, 45 references to Buffs, 27 references to Whites, 20 references to Partridge, with 1 reference each to Brown and Red Cochins. Those numbers equate to 46% of the ads in the 1924 ABA yearbook being for Cochins. Pretty popular little guys 79 years ago! Just thought I would pass that little tidbit of trivia on to you!

You all should have received your Breeders Directory by now. The format seems to be well received, and I wish I could have included more breeder info in section 2, but I was limited by the number of Breeders Directory information sheets that were sent in.

One of the things that were discussed at last year's Eastern National was reference type book that could be sent to all new

members. We decided it was something that could certainly be done and we have in fact started putting it together. My hopes are to have it finished sometime this summer. If anyone can think of anything that should go into a club publication of this type, please feel free to submit an article or an idea. John Burgess is putting together a very inclusive section covering the breed and variety characteristics as described in the APA and ABA standards. I plan to include sections on housing, feeding, hatching and brooding, washing and show preparation and vaccination. Other items will pop up I am sure, and I will be contacting some of you to ask for your assistance.

The 2002 National Awards were ordered at the beginning of March, so you should see them very soon. Additionally, I am just about caught up on all of the Master Breeder Certificate of Merits and District Meet Certificates, so once I print out the last one I will get them in the mail. You patience is appreciated and I don't want you to think I have forgotten. I do the certificates a few at a time as my schedule allows. And a busy schedule it is! I am taking undergraduate classes at night and will have finished a degree in Management by the time I am done out here. I am also coaching girls fast pitch softball (11-12 year old division). Courtney was interested in playing and the team only had one coach so I volunteered to assist. If you were to compare the two coaches to the good cop/bad cop scenario, I would be the bad cop. The girls think I make them run too much!

<u>Election Results:</u> I would like to encourage all Cochins International members to thank the past officers for all the good work they have done for the club. The New Year brings us a new slate of officers for the next two years.

The ballots are in and the votes have been counted. Our new officers include Tom Roebuck, Jr. as president with 89 votes. Tom is in charge of coordinating the placement of the Nationals and making sure the club runs in a smooth and orderly fashion. I certainly wish you the best through this hatching season. Keep those cochins on Champion Row.

# COLOUR BREEDING OF PARTRIDGE WYANDOTTES

Dr. W. C. Carefoot Originally printed in the 1977 ABA Quarterly

Although written as a Wyandotte article the information as it applies to the Partridge Variety is certainly relevant.  $\sim$  TR

#### A CLARIFICATION F. P. Jeffrey

...The BANTAM STANDARD calls for hackle color in the Partridge male of black with narrow edging of rich brilliant red. BRITISH POULTRY STANDARDS, on the other hand, require a bright orange-yellow hackle, shading to bright lemon-yellow, each feather having a clearly defined glossy-black stripe down the middle. By publishing Dr. Carefoot's article there was no intention to suggest that any change in BANTAM STANDARD is being considered, American judges will be looking for hackles edged with red, not lemon.

The value of the Carefoot article is not diminished, however, by this clarification because distribution of black (amount and quality of penciling, for example) in the feathers of the pullet-bred male or cock-bred female would remain the same. The individual breeder who practices this type of double mating would have to decide on the depth of red color he wants to select for. ~ F.P.J.

When Partridge Wyandottes were first introduced the people drawing up the standard decided to go for the simple beauty which has since caused Partridges to be called the "Royalty of the Show pen." It was a relatively easy matter to decide that the colour of the ideal male would be black with a beetle-green sheen and dark-grey undercolour except for the hackles, shoulders, back and bays. The hackles were to be black with beetlegreen sheen uniformly edged with lemon shading to orange at the top of the head, both hackles to match, shoulders and back to be bright red and the wing-bays to be rich bay. Likewise, the ideal female had to be of soft, light partridge brown ground colour uniformly penciled with concentric rings of black; the rings to be fine and starting inside the feather, following the shape of the feather. The tail and wing feathers to be black or penciled where they are hidden and penciled to match the body wherever they were on view with the hackle to be as penciled as possible.

These are very simply defined and precise requirements, but when the breeders attempted to attain these ideals they found they had problems. If they had a male with a solid stripe in the neck hackle his female relations were too strong in the black and this showed itself in black specks in the ground colour of the female. If, however, they had a female of correct ground colour then the male relations were too red, with centre-cores in the neck-hackle and very little black in the saddle hackle. It therefore became apparent that two pens were required, one to breed exhibition males, and one to breed exhibition females. The former were called cockerel-breeders and the latter pullet-breeders. From this moment on partridges were really two colours, the cockerel-breeders being a black-red and the pullet breeders a gold-penciled.

The colour problem was to find the correct mate for the ideal show bird. The complete solution is still not known but I think

we are very close to the answer. I will try to give the logic behind this problem, which may be helpful to breeders of other varieties where double mating is required for colour reasons.

The Ideal Partridge Wyandotte of either sex is so precisely marked that it is inconceivable that the mate for this bird should be anything but equally precisely marked, but this marking may not be so simply described. Since the perfect show bird is unlikely to be available, the mate for a show bird must be chosen to counterbalance the defects of the said show-bird. For this reason we have to find out which colour patterns in the male correspond with which in the female.

#### Several Definite Results

- 1. The neck hackle colour of the female is very close to the lightest part of the neck hackle of the male and the width of edging is related.
- 2. Shaftiness of hackles is related in both sexes.
- 3. Colour inside the hackles of the male is related to penciling in the female in some way.
- 4. Solid black hackles in the male are associated with black specks in the ground colour of the female (called mossiness).
- 5. The strength of the black and the beetle-green sheen in both sexes is related.
- 6. Uniformity of body colour in the female is connected with matching hackles in the male.

#### What a Cock-bred Female Must Have

- 1. Lemon-edged neck-hackles as bright as possible and as free from shaft as possible.
- 2. Beetle-green sheen wherever it is possible to be seen, for instance in the neck and tail. Some of the best cockerel-bred females shine green on the body in the sunlight.
- 3. Very little penciling, with what there is very coarse and blurred.
- 4. As little shaft on the body as possible, apart from the breast.
- 5. Primaries as dark as possible.

Having got the basic requirements for a cockerel-bred pullet other minor details probably determine the selection of a mate for a particular male. For instance, it is likely that if a cock-bred female is completely free from body colour then her sons may fail in the wing-bays, but if she has too much body colour then her sons will have shafty hackles. The margin for error is very fine as can be seen from the fact that a completely sound male with perfect wing-bays is rare indeed. Consequently, the amount of body colour on the female to be chosen depends on her mate.

#### What the Pullet-bred Male Must Have

- 1. Beetle-green sheen wherever he is black.
- 2. Fairly bright neck hackles, the colour of the brightest part of the neck the same as the neck hackle colour of the ideal female. This discovery has led to a virtual disappearance of foxy females

# Recollections from the All Cochin Show

It has been called the "Show of Shows", "The Only One of its kind ever held" and definitely the envy of the Poultry World as no other breed as far as I know ever achieved this type of show in recent history. It was the All Cochin Show, ONLY Cochins. To this event exhibitors and supporters of the breed were invited; a weekend devoted to one breed and the people who loved this breed like no other.

The show was held in the late October, early November timeframe in the tiny town of Somonauk, IL, just west of Chicago. One little motel, whose claim to fame was a tame deer that roamed the grounds, one small restaurant and probably a gas station or two. Nothing that would otherwise draw your attention to it or for that matter, would want to make you stop for something other than gas or a bite to eat. But for one weekend of the year it became the home of the All Cochin Show, the World Series for Cochin breeders. For if you won nowhere else during the year or after that, a win at the All Cochin show was the win that mattered, because anybody that was anybody in the Cochin World showed that weekend.

The show for many years and until near the end of its run was held in the high school gymnasium, the floor covered in plastic and the cages neatly arranged in rows running back and forth across the floor. The show management's table was neatly arranged on the stage, because after the morning's polishing and primping was over and the judging began everyone but the judge and his clerk cleared the floor. The exhibitors and spectators departed to the balcony to carefully scrutinize the judging that was taking place down on the floor. When the judge had placed a class, say the White Cochin Cocks, he would exit the aisle and the exhibitors were allowed in to check the placings, with congratulations or consternations given to the winner. The aisle was again cleared and the judge and clerk would move on to the White Hens and the process would resume all over again, a very unique way of running a show by today's standards.

The show was held under the banner of the U.S. Cochin Bantam Club, the only Cochin organization at the time as there was not a club for Large Cochins back then. In fact my recollections are that they didn't have Large Cochins in exhibition until near the end of the shows that they held. The show was run by Lyle Troeger and his wife and supported financially by Cub Mall of nearby Sandwich, IL. Cub was widely known and regarded for his prize winning BB Red Old English Bantams.

The show's run was I believe from the 50's through the late 60's. This fact I'm not 100% sure of because I was a young lad at the time tagging along with my older brother for whom Cochins were a passion and winning at the All Cochin Show was a goal that he eventually achieved. Although I did show some Large Partridge and Buff Cochins near the end of the shows run in the late 60's. They say that you're only as old as you feel so some days I feel older than


I am and some days younger but have many fond memories of the show and the exhibitors that I met there.

I met Scott Adams for the first time at the show, at the time he had some outstanding Barred Cochin Bantams, I believe from A.S. Gibbons, a bald man with a tam and good Barred Bantams. Eugene Halbach from Bristol, WI at that time before the move to AZ, I think that Gene had nearly all the colors of Cochin Bantams at that time but was probably best known for his White Bantams. When Gene brought in a string of White Bantams it was a real production as he would show 10 cocks, 10 hens, 10 cockerels, 10 pullets and an old and young trio. People would gather around just to watch the birds being placed in their cages and comment on this bird or that bird and their chances. In Whites there were other exhibitors and they had gender equity back then as Clare Hicks and Hazel Brickey gave the boys a real run for their money and sometimes took their money as they were tough competition just like today. Dr. Serstad, a dentist from WS was also a top competitor in that color as well as the Blacks.

Probably the man to beat back then in the Black Cochin Bantams was Ross Blanford from Albuquerque, NM. His name was synonymous with good Black Bantams at that time, but he had tough competition from Horace Abbitt from Indianapolis, IN and Robert Enslen from Marion, IN. You could usually count on one of these three to come away with the trophies in Black Cochin Bantams. Bob Enslen was best known for his excellent Black females which were very hard to beat and usually in fantastic condition and of great quality.

Ken Krieder of Middlebury, IN showed some good Buff and Partridge Bantams as did "Coon Dog" Sam Wakefield from Fort Smith, Arkansas. In addition to his quality Cochins he usually had a coon dog story for the banquet. I know that there were some good Blue and Mottled Bantams as well but I can't but names to them right now.

These are some of my recollections from back when the All Cochin Show was the envy of the poultry world. If any of you can come up with some additions to my memories or corrections I would look forward to it.










One of Rich Barczewski's Breeding Pens of Large Partridge Cochins

Lesson on Producing Partridge Color

What constitutes Partridge color and how can we produce it? In my observations of Partridge color during the past few years, I find all shades of color, from the old lemon hackle to a black mahogany shade in males, and females from light golden to a dark smudgy brown in ground color and penciling from double, triple, mossy and no penciling at all.

The most common fault I find in all present day Partridge color is males too dark and females marked like Dark Brown Leghorns; a little penciling on the breast and the rest of the body color stippled a little courser than the Dark Brown Leghorn female.

It seems in our desire to breed away from the old lemon hackle Partridge color we passed the happy medium, that rich brilliant cherry-red color with clean cut striping in males and red-bay in females with distinct black triple penciling, to the dark smudgy mahogany color in both male and female. These dark colored birds do show the distinct striping in males, and most of these dark hackles show a distinct black cape at edge of hackle where it meets the back. This black cape is caused by the red edging running out before it reaches the end of the feather. What we want in a real Partridge colored male is a good brilliant green stripe entirely surrounded by a bright brilliant red edging in every feather of hackle, back and saddle and each section should match the other. Please note hackle, back and saddle male feather illustrations, they portray what I mean by distinct striping and matching in all sections.


Now I want to say a few words of warning on what I consider the most important factor of a Partridge male in producing good back penciling in females. Have you ever looked at the back on a large Brown Leghorn male? It is always a shade or two darker than the hackle and saddle, a dark mahogany red with no striping visible, this is why your Dark Brown Leghorn female shows striping on the back. This is also the reason why your dark colored Partridge male throws so many irregular and course stippled penciled females instead of regular, clear and distinct penciled females. A clean cut striped back in males to my mind is a most essential bird to breed good clear penciled females from. As well as being what we want in a good standard Partridge color.

In females avoid the light lemon hackles and light bay ground color, no matter how well penciled the bird may be. What we want is a rich, red bay ground color and not as dark as a smudgy mahogany. This rich red bay ground color carrying a good distinct black, triple penciling on each feather is what we should all strive to breed for in good Partridge colored females. Bear in mind that to have a well-marked Partridge female, she must be penciled uniform all over from the top of her head to the top main tail feathers. Watch your undercolor in both males and females, be sure that it is a dark slate color and also watch light or cotton undercolor in hackle and base of tails in your males. This has a tendency to crop out in good bright colored Partridge males.


I realize that with a few exceptions in our Partridge colored bantam it will be quite a problem to get the kind of stock I have described. I suggest that you Partridge breeders try the following: If you have a well penciled female in your yards that has

about correct ground color, mate her to the brightest cherry red top colored male you have and from this mating select your best colored and striped male and use him on your best Penciled females the following season, and I am sure that you will see results in clear striping in hackles, backs and saddles from the offspring of this mating in male birds as well as clear penciled females. You will also find that the bright colored male birds will show some tingeing of red in the lowest breast and fluff feathers. Don't be afraid of this, as you will find such birds very useful in breeding well penciled females. Do not be discouraged if your pullets do not pencil up the first year as well you expected. When these pullets molt in as hens, if bred from the kind of birds I have described they will pencil up well. Unlike laced varieties of poultry, which as a rule hard to molt into proper feather the second year, especially laced Wyandottes, the Partridge color females seems to improve in the second and third year. Please note, female feathers in the feather chart.

The illustrations that accompany this lesson are drawings from a two-year-old cock bird and hen. They are full brother and sister and are bred from a cock and hen that were their equal in color and they also have produced cockerels and pullets that are correct colored and this is the reason that I base my foregone statements on the fact that we have got to use bright, clean colored males and well penciled females if we are to produce the proper color the Standard calls for. I have not touched on wing bows or bars, tails or breasts, these will come about right. What I might say that I think there is no more beautiful color bred on bantams today that good Partridge color and I hope that the above information may help a little in producing better Partridge color bantams.

so predominant a few years ago when the fanciers were frightened that a male with a bright neck was partially cock-bred.

- 3. Hackles with centre core of bay, and not a definite light shaft, which will lead to shaftiness in the females.
- 4. Some red on the breast, as completely solid black breast is related to heavy penciling.
- 5. Wing bays of which an exhibition male would be proud.

As in cockerel-breeders the male chosen depends on the female selected. If she is too heavy (penciling) choose a male with little black provided that what is there is the correct black; if she is weak in the penciling then choose a male with plenty of black.

Your breeding results can be seen from the chickens at "unisex" stage of eight weeks or so. At this stage the sexes are most alike in colour. A pullet-breeding cockerel will have feathers on the lower breast and on the wing coverts that are penciled. The cockerels which are the finest and sharpest in the penciling and which have these feathers of soft partridge brown colour are the ones that contain the potential to breed good coloured females.

It has often been written that the main point in selecting a pullet-bred male or a cockerel-bred female is that they are bred from a long line of exhibition birds. This, of course, is true and if a cockerel-bred female or pullet-bred male is, as I have described them, then it is certain that its pedigree will be true. However, not all birds with correct pedigree are themselves worthy of a place in the breeding pen.

I should like to stress that I have only discussed the colour and the markings of the Partridge Wyandotte. At no time in selecting a breeding pen should the shape, the quality and breadth of feather, head, eye colour, leg colour and general vigour be forgotten as without these points any breed lacks character.

Further clarification: When Dr. Carefoot refers to a Cock-bred Female or a Pulletbred Male he is talking about choosing a female for your breeding pen that will produce show quality males and choosing a male for your breeding pen that will produce show quality females respectively. ~ TR




Fig 64-2001 American Standard of Perfection

Note: I included the Silver Penciled Color Pattern Feathers to illustrate the proper penciling and marking as they relate to the Partridge color pattern. Keep in mind that Partridge is the "Gold" opposite of the Silver Penciled variety. Refer to the description of the Partridge color pattern in your Standards of Perfection for the proper color markings as they apply to Partridge. Simply put, substitute Reddish-Bay for White/Silvery White in the above feathers.



# Description of PARTRIDGE Plumage Color and Color Pattern As presented in the APA Standard of Perfection (2001)

~ Partridge Male ~

HEAD: Web of feather, lustrous rich red.

NECK: Hackle - web of feather, lustrous greenish black with a narrow lacing of medium shade of rich, bril-

Front of neck - black.

BACK: Back, including Saddle - web of feather, lustrous, greenish black with narrow facing of a medium shade of rich brilliant red, a slight shafting of rich red permissible. Rich brilliant red predominating on surface of upper back; saddle matching with hackle in color. TAIL: Main Tail - web, black.

Main and Lesser Sickles - lustrous, greenish black.

Coverts - lustrous greenish black, laced with medium shade of rich brilliant red.

WINGS: Fronts - black.

Bows - a medium shade of rich brilliant red.

Coverts - lustrous, greenish black, forming a distinct wing bar of this color across entire wing when folded.

Primaries - black, with narrow edging of reddish bay on lower webs.

Secondaries - lower webs black with lower half reddish bay, terminating with black at end of each feather; upper webs, black; secondaries when folded forming a triangular reddish bay wing-bay between the wing bar and tips of secondary feathers. BREAST: Lustrous, greenish black.

BODY AND FLUFF: Body - black Fluff - black, slightly tinged with red.

LEGS AND TOES: Lower Thighs - black.

Shanks and Toes - yellow.

Shanks and Toe Feathers – black.

UNDERCOLOR OF ALL SECTIONS: Slate.

\* Note- Pencilings in all Partridge varieties should be distinct in sharp contrast to the ground color, be regular in shape, uniform In width, and conform to the contour of the feather. Each feather in the back, breast, body, wing bows and thighs should have three or more pencilings.

NECK: Hackle - black, slightly penciled with deep reddish bay and laced with reddish bay.

TAIL: Main Tail - black, except two top feathers which have - lower webs, black; upper webs, deep reddish bay, penciled with black.





#### PARTRIDGE PLUMAGE DESCRIPTION (ABA)

#### Color of Male

HEAD: Surface of feather, brilliant medium shade of rich red.

NECK: Hackle - surface of feather, lustrous greenish black with narrow edging around entire surface of rich brilliant red; shaft, black; to match saddle. Front of Neck- black.

BACK: Surface of feather, lustrous greenish black with narrow edging around entire surface of a medium shade of rich brilliant red, a slight shafting of rich red is permissible. The surface of upper back should appear to be rich glossy, red when viewed from a distance too great to distinguish the individual feathers.

SADDLE: Surface of feather, lustrous greenish black with narrow edging around entire surface of rich brilliant red; shaft black; to match hackle in color.

TAIL: Main Tail - black, shafts black. Sickles & Lesser Sickles - lustrous greenish black. Coverts - lustrous greenish black, with narrow edging around entire surface of rich brilliant red.

WINGS: Shoulders & Fronts - black. Bows - medium shade of rich brilliant red. Coverts - lustrous greenish black, forming a well defined bar when wing is folded. Primaries - black, lower edges of lower feathers, reddish bay, shafts black. Secondaries - black, exposed portion of outer web forming wing bay, reddish bay; shafts, black.

BREAST: Lustrous black with greenish sheen.

BODY & STERN: Body - black. Stern - fluff, black slightly tinged with red.

LOWER THIGHS: Black.

UNDERCOLOR: Slate in all sections.

#### **Color of Female**

PLUMAGE: Penciling in the partridge female should be of uniform width and conform to the shape of the feather. Each feather of the back, breast, body, wing bows and thighs should have three pencilings; the center black, then alternately reddish bay and black, ending with reddish bay edging around entire surface. More attention should be given to the brightness and sharpness of

the reddish bay ground color and the almost jet black penciling than whether the bird appears lighter or darker than an individual preference. The ideal is one uniform color over the entire body of the bird.

HEAD: Deep reddish bay.

NECK: Hackle - surface of feather, center portion black; slightly penciled with deep reddish bay, with narrow edging around the entire surface of deep reddish bay. Front of neck - same as breast. BACK & CUSHION: Deep reddish bay with distinct pencilings of black.

TAIL: Main Tail - black, except two top feathers, which are deep reddish bay on the upper web, penciled with black, shafts black. Coverts- deep reddish bay, with distinct pencilings of black.

WINGS: Shoulders, Fronts, Bows and Coverts - deep reddish bay, with distinct pencilings of black. Primaries - black with edging of deep reddish bay on outer webs, shafts black. Secondaries - inner webs black; outer webs deep reddish bay, with distinct penciling of black extending around outer edge of feather, shafts black.

BREAST: Deep reddish bay with distinct pencilings of black. BODY & STERN: Body - deep reddish bay penciled with black. Stem - Huff, deep reddish bay.

LOWER THIGHS; Deep reddish bay, penciled with black.

UNDERCOLOR: Slate in all directions.

#### Disqualifications

Positive white in main tail feathers, sickles or secondaries, Shanks other than yellow or dusky yellow.

#### **Defects**

Purple sheen in males - Unevenness of ground color in females - Dullness, mealiness and smokiness in ground color of females - White in undercolor - Red on partridge males is not to be so dark as to give the impression that the bird is black - No male is to be awarded a first premium if ten percent or more of his breast feathers are other than black.

# Partridge Cochin Bantams

Partridge Cochin Bantams, like all others in the Cochin family, had their origin in China, from whence they were brought to England, and later to America, where they at once captured the American fancier's heart. At first they showed a tendency to be large and coarse, with rather poor markings, but now they are bred to a point of perfection. The fanciers who first took them up knew what they wanted, and really went out to get it.

If you ask a breeder of partridge color, the secret of getting and holding this color, he will have no secret to tell you. Invariably his answer will be; "I just line breed, and use two breeding pens—one for males and one for females."

Make no mistake; you cannot breed good exhibition birds in both sexes from the same pen. I do not say this to disillusion the novice who is beginning to breed this color, or the one who is just starting on his show ring, but to warn them what they must do in breeding this color pattern.

One must follow a set breeding program and keep his cockerel and pullet breeding pens separate. He may by chance get the pens mixed

up and use a good bird from one pen in the other pen. The result will be a bunch of culls.

To breed exhibition pullets choose close to the Standard. Mate them to a male with hackle feathers heavily striped, and with back and wing bows inclined more towards the dark side of brick red.

To breed good cockerels; choose a male to head this pen that is close to the Standard. His mates should be females that are poorly penciled all over, and very light in hackle. In both these pens be sure that all birds have good type, and that the foot feathering is full and extended to the end of the middle toe.

Cochin Bantams must have dry pens and yards, and those kept clean. They are good layers of medium size brown eggs. — JOE DAVIN
