

Overall the cochins were very nice looking with several different varieties shown.

The Missouri State Poultry Association held the 2008 Cochin Western National at Sedalia, MO, April 19. We had 111 bantams and 19 standards, with 19 bantams and 4 standards in the junior show. The national bantam was won by Robert Rhodes with a black hen and the reserve was a black cock also by Robert Rhodes. The standard was won by Gerald Church with a

Black hen and the reserve was a black cock also by Gerald Church. Jamie Matts judged the bantam class and Andy Barnes judged the standards – job well done. The champion overall of the bantams was the bantam cochins by Robert Rhodes and the reserve overall was the standard by Gerald Church. Robert and Gerald did a very good job in raising these birds – very, very nice. Congrats.

The second show was a special meet.
The bantam show was judged by Dwayne
Ballard. The winner was Gerald Church with a
black hen and the reserve was a white cock by
Pam Hamilton. The standard winner was Gerald
Church with a black hen as champion and
reserve was a black cock, which were also
champion and reserve Asiatic. The large fowl
was judged by Larry Denny.

The junior show was judged by James Miller and the second show was judged by Dale Postma and Dwight Madsen. The first show champion featherleg was won by Breanna Bergquist with a black hen and a black pullet was reserve featherleg, also by Breanna. Large fowl was won by Breanna with a black and the reserve was a buff hen by Constance Bothwell. (continued on page 3)







News from Around the World

Spring has not yet sprung here in N. Virginia (USA). We have not had much snow, but freezing rain in the area (12 Feb) caused havoc for commuters and voters. Temperatures have ranged from 8 to 75 deg. F in recent weeks.

The hatching season is already underway in some areas of the Northern Hemisphere. A wide range of temperature fluctuations seem to be the norm in most areas. Weather across Europe has been somewhat warmer than usual allowing for considerable rain and damp conditions. Research at the Mass. Inst. Of Technology (MIT) and the Center for Disease Control & Prevention has provided new insight on Avian Flu infections. Infection begins when a protein (HA) on the flu virus's surface sticks to a receptor on the surface of a cell lining the throat. These receptors have specific shapes created by sugar-like molecules that accept only HA proteins of a particular shape. Bird receptors are designated 2-3, while humans have slightly different structures designated 2-6. These 2-6 receptors also have two different shapes designated "cone" and "umbrella". The significance of this research is the finding that a virus's HA protein has to fit into the "umbrella" shaped 2-6 receptor to become a truly human virus and explains why only a few H5N1 bird flu strains have taken off. This discovery could lead to a way to rapidly test virus samples gathered from birds to determine if they already possess the human compatibility feature of accessing the "umbrella" shaped 2-6 receptor.

The H5N1 Avian Influenza (bird flu) is still a viable threat in some areas of the world. Two deaths were reported in Indonesia in mid

February. One was a 3-year-old boy in Jakarta; the other, a 16-year-old boy in Central Java Province, bringing the death toll attributed to the bird flu in Indonesia to 105.

Australia:

David Plant advises that he is working on publication of a new book entitled "Handbook on Pekin/Cochin Colours." This should be an interesting publication since they have so many colorful varieties "down under" in Australia. This publication should provide interesting insight into how these new varieties were created.

Germany:

Ardjan Warnshuis noted that participation in the European Show for cochins and brahmas (large fowl and bantams) in late November was down with only breeders from Belgium, Holland and Germany in attendance.

In December, the German National Show was held in Dortmund with good representation in cochins (large fowl and bantams). Also, in December, the Dutch Club Show was held in Enschede, Holland. One of our members, Ardjan Warnshuis, had Best Male and Second Best Cochin Bantam on a partridge cockerel. Congratulations Ardjan!!

In January, the German Cochin Bantam Club Show was held. There were 450 bantams entered representing all recognized colours.

Great Britain:

The Cochin Club of Great Britain has their web site up and running www.cochinclub.co.uk. The big buffs shown belong to Helen Pope in Nottinghamshire.

At the Federation Show, there were 66 large fowl cochin entries. Best Cochin was a Buff Hen by Richard Bett. Best Opposite Sex was a Blue Cock by Sue Adams. One of our CI Members, Helen Pope won the Buff Cock Class

and had third on a Buff Hen. Following the judging there was a lively discussion about the acceptance of a Frizzle Variety. It was agreed that there would be an Experimental Class for Frizzles at the next Federation Show and if a minimum of four (4) breeders entered, this would give grounds to proceed with the process of establishing the Frizzle Variety.

Romania:

Bobo Athes notes that the "Avian Flu Alarm" is "off" at present and they are going to have a poultry show for Cochins and Brahmas on 24 Feb. Bobo has several interviews planned with Cochin Club Officials in the USA and in Europe. A summary of these interviews will be published in the April Issue of Aviculture Europe, a digital poultry magazine. He is also working on publication of a book on poultry breeds that should be ready very soon, noting that the largest chapters are devoted to Cochins and Brahmas. Unfortunately, the first publication is to be in Romanian.

Sweden:

Helen Sjostrom reports strange winter weather there with temperatures ranging from -2 degrees F to 40 degrees F with mostly ice rather than snow. Sweden has implemented three levels of protection for protecting fowl flocks against the Avian flu:

Level 1 - small risk; birds can be outside with covering roof.

Level 2 - risk; birds must be kept inside as much as possible.

Level 3 - high risk; no birds outside at all.

Sweden is divided near the center by the Dalaalven River. Above this river, level 1 is in place and below the river, level 2 is in place due to avian flu outbreaks down in Europe.

In closing, I hope everyone in the Northern Hemisphere gets off to a great start in

the new hatching season and that those in the Southern Hemisphere are concluding a great hatching season and enjoying the "fruits of their labor."

President's Notes:

Here it is February, and I find myself almost done with hatching. I am sure there will be one or two breedings over the summer that I'll want to do using broodies, but it feels pretty good to know that I am not far from turning off the incubator! I have had another pretty good year so far hatching, with around 200 large fowl out, and now the bantams are starting to pick up the pace. I am done hatching large Buffs and Whites, but I am still setting large Barreds as I get them. I want to keep my chick numbers under 400 so we'll see how that turns out.

On to more important stuff; the 2008 Nationals. If you haven't heard yet, the Eastern National will be held as an All-Cochin show in Newport, TN, the first weekend in April. This hasn't been done in almost 30 years and the "Something to Crow About Poultry Club," offered to host this event as part of their bid for our Eastern National.

We are happy to announce that the judges that were selected to preside over this first in a long time event are Bob Carothers (IL) and Jamie Matts (NY). In addition to the regular classes that will be judged according to ABA and APA rules and regulations, we will be doing something aimed at being fun as well as challenging. We are going to do a "Group" challenge. The rules are simple; each challenger will bring to the bench a "Group" of four birds consisting of a Cock, Hen, Cockerel and a Pullet. These birds must come from the exhibitor's entries in the show, so in order to compete; they must have at least one bird in each class (C/H/K/P). Groups by variety will be judged first and the first two contenders will bring their birds to the judge to be compared. The judge will select the best group from the first two, and then the next challenger in that variety will

bench his or her birds for the judge to determine if they will beat out the previously selected group. This will continue in that variety until there are no more challengers. Once all the variety group winners are selected the best overall group will be chosen from the variety group winners. We plan to do this in the Large Cochins as well. This isn't an original idea for a breeder's challenge. The idea is courtesy of Keith LeGrand, and he said that they used to do this at the original All-Cochin shows. So in the interest of good fun, we are trying this challenge at the first All-Cochin show in the 21st Century! I think the most interesting part of this challenge is that the exhibitor brings the birds to the judge, much like a cat show, so match up your best four birds, and bring them to the bench.

Also reinstated from previous All-Cochins shows are two traveling trophies courtesy of Keith LeGrand who has his name engraved on both of them as a previous winner and has offered them back to Cochins International to start the tradition all over again. The first trophy is in Memory of Ed Turpin for Champion White Cochin, and the second trophy is the Brad Atwood Memorial Trophy for Overall Champion Cochin. These are very nice trophies will beautiful bases for the engraved plaques with tasteful silver cups on top of each. To win one of these three times would indeed be an honor.

As far as other awards, the host show has put up \$500 dollars toward the National Meet and it will be distributed as follows:

All in all my 2007 hatch proved to be quite successful. I made some great progress in both the large and bantam Barreds, as well as the Buffs in both sizes and the Whites in the large fowl. I wound up with one nice bantam white pullet and a couple dandy cockerels, and I've added an awesome pullet from a fellow breeder, so we'll see what they produce this year. In the Buff Bantams I have decided to heed some age old advice and use only hens for breeding this year. I have some real nice looking pullets, that were out of my later hatches last year but I am going to let them mature and go through their first molt to see if they hold their color and feather quality. Stringy tail feathers are a common defect in the Buffs and it sometimes doesn't show up until the females have molted in their second year feathers. I am using cockerels on the hens, and that's simply because they are better than last year's cockerels. Nice sound color and I am seeing an improvement in feather width. I've stepped outside of my game plan with only one of the breeding match ups. This pullet is just too nice not to use. Good beefy head, good eye color, good size and feathers over the cushion that are as wide as my thumb. As a group the

bantam Buff Cockerels I am using for breeding have better width across the back and through the cushion too. I see too many Buffs that narrow as they finish toward their back ends. If viewed from above they are kind of heart shaped, where the width should be the same from front to back. I am making progress and that's what it's all about, but I think I am still about two years away from being really satisfied enough with them to compete with the Blacks and Whites. My culling practices are paying off too. I eliminate any male that shows white in his wings as a cockerel and also cull for poor undercolor. I have seen a major improvement in two years with the undercolor in both the males and females, and it has also improved the soundness and evenness of their top color. There is an article on culling in this newsletter that I think is well done and points out the importance of being hard on your birds, as a steward of the breed.

I need to also thank Don Holt for sharing a couple pair of his Silver Laced Bantams with me! Thanks Don, for the start. I'll do my best to keep improving them. They pullets are just starting to lay so I'll have some Silvers out soon! I have a couple of crosses in store for them as well as breeding them pure this year, but won't get into those details until I see the results. Although I may not see any payoff with the crosses until the f2 or f3 generations. Patience and good record keeping!!!! Both will pay big dividends in the end!

The Lost Art of Critical Selection 1/30/2008

Culling is the process by which one removes from one's flock disadvantatious birds, birds that would, if bred, perpetuate and disseminate undesirable traits throughout the flock.

For example: Let's assume you have a cock with six hens. If one of the hens has wry tail (tail pointing out into left field), there is a strong chance that all of her chicks will have crooked tails pointing out into left field. Now, if she happens to be a strong layer with high fertility, you might get a high proportion of viable eggs from her, leading to lots of chicks with tails in left field. Moreover, that's considering a hen. If you have a cock with a tail in left field, then his genes are going to spread out throughout the flock and make a mess of everything. What's worse, it will literally take many hatching seasons to rectify the situation.

The answer to this difficult problem? Culling; i.e. removing the wry-tailed birds from the start so that their genes do not carry on through the flock. Here I have mentioned wry tail, yet there are many worries: poor laying skills (concerning birds who by Standard definition are supposed to be good layers), small size for those who (according to the Standard) are to serve as high quality meat birds, crooked breast bones, deformed heads, crooked combs, off-colors, cross-beak, etc... The fact is that the simpler the organism is, the more they tend to produce and the greater the chance of drastic variation in the bred outcome. Lots of positives...and lots of negatives, pop up. The good thing is that the more one culls at

first, the fewer culls follow later because general quality is improved.

How to cull? Well, we luckily sell dressed birds for meat. Of the males hatched here, only the few select make it past roaster age. Among the hens, any that doesn't have the proper conformation (body type) for laying become soup, or are sold dressed for soup. Those that are built to lay well, yet do not have some of the finer traits, will not be breeders. They go to the laying house for their pullet year (6 months-18months), and then they're soup.

We deal exclusively with rare breeds. They need much support and MORE BREEDERS! However, especially because the numbers are so small, the breeding birds must be of high quality. One person with inferior stock who then gives away or sells inferior stock can really hurt the breed when one considers that their flock might constitute as much as 10% to 20% of the breeding population. If their stock goes out and is then bred such that these birds become commonplace, they risk undermining the entire breed.

This is what has happened to the formerly spectacular Houdan. If one reads the old texts, Houdans were once some of the very best meat birds available. Indeed, for decades they dominated the Parisian and London markets. Their meat is fine-grained, very white in the breast, and supremely juicy. Yet, the big, impressive birds of the past are gone. The three French hens (Houdan, Crevecoeur, and La Fleche) were of such culinary prowess that they became one of the primary measures of meat quality. Having black feathers and being of high quality, they were so good that they made black pin-feathers a sign of good eating. It is theorized that the BLACK Jersey Giant was developed as a black bird so that it would be reminiscent to,

and able to compete with, French (black pinfeathered) quality. Considering this historic position of honor, I am amazed that the only stock available now is universally undersized and, frankly, a bit pathetic. This only happened because the birds reserved for breeding were not selected via the Standard.

Because of my dedication to these breeds, I am not going to disperse inferior stock and thus perpetuate the problem. Now, with some rare birds almost all the stock available pales in comparison, yet improved stock, stock that is moving forward on the way to breedstandard recovery, needs to be the goal. Then, one educates the new caretakers as to points for which one should aim in future breeding; i.e., one teaches the new owners to cull. Thus, I effectively slaughter at one point or the other, any bird that doesn't make the cut (if you would ;-).

As far as slaughtering is concerned, it is, in my opinion, (and I only say this here because this is a forum for breeders) part of being a mature and seasoned breeder. Some people, like my neighbor, can't do it. That's OK. I do it for her, sort of like a pinch-hitter. The important thing is that the culling takes place, and with each season the breed moves forward. I am saddened when I hear somebody talk about chickens through the Bambi lenses, because I know that they're going to be held back as breeders, and thus, as a caretaker of the breed. Why? In so doing, they are psychologically projecting human qualities onto their chickens that their chickens do not have. This, of course, does their chickens no good, because they're chickens. Now, if one so chooses to treat one's chickens like little people cool, it's all good! However, this is a fantasy. We are all entitled to our fantasies, but one shouldn't run around

calling other people immoral because they don't conform to one's fantasy. Indeed, that might be called immoral because it makes others bad because they're not like us. My mother, God love her, dresses her dog in a sweater before it goes out to pee. It runs around in the snow and gets all wet. The sweater does nothing; it might even annoy the dog. It loves the snow because it's a dog. It wears a sweater because my mother likes to pretend that it's the child who will never leave home. The dog could care less...because it's a dog. My mother, however, doesn't go around calling people immoral for not dressing their dogs in sweaters....thank God!

The bottom line is that poor quality stock leads to more poor quality stock. Poor quality stock in rare breeds can be devastating for the longevity of the breed. Conservation breeders need to be highly aware of the mark of quality and strongly cull those birds whose genes would undermine the breed.

Lavender Pekins: Slow but Steady Progress being made

I am writing this article following a request from the PBCA Newsletter editor, Chris Hardman, who is also the editor of Chicken Chat and a good friend and a fellow Pekin fancier, Steven Cox from Lismore who is also successfully breeding a line of Lavender Pekins originally developed by myself. Contemplating this request I have re-read my first article on the subject which appeared in *Australian Poultry* (June/July 2000) as to where the Lavender

Pekin is now and what changes I would make to the article. Firstly, I wonder if others have the Lavender yet, has anyone exhibited them in some other place other than North Queensland?

I don't think I would change the article much at all and certainly don't regret my love affair with creating new Pekin colours and patterns. Looking at old photos of the Lavenders in 2000 and comparing it to my current birds I don't feel I have improved type vastly since then. I have just moved it from one bloodline to another and have improved its stamina in the process and perhaps this I will see further advances in the overall type and flow of feather and feather quality.

I shall briefly revise my Australian Poultry article on Lavender genetics so the reader has a grasp on how the Lavender Pekin was created. Lavender is a recessive colour gene, meaning that a bird can be carrying the colour but not showing it externally or visibly because to have the lavender colouration a bird must have two sets of the gene, one from the father and one from the mother. This means if you mate a pure Lavender bird to a pure black bird, the chicks will only be black but when you mate a chick back to its Lavender parent you will, in theory, get 50% Lavender or two chicks out of every four will be the visible Lavender colour. If you mate brother x sister from the progeny of the original mating one will get, in theory, 25% lavender or one in four chicks. Both parents must have the Lavender gene to get a Lavender chick.

The most important thing to remember is that the bird with only one Lavender gene cannot be identifies unless it is mated to a bird that carries that gene as well and enough

chickens are produced to cover aberrations in the above theoretical colour ratios.

My friend Richard Lay began the Lavender Pekin in about 1992 by crossing Lavender Belgian bantams to Black Pekins. I remember him describing the first Lavenders of the F2 generation as extremely good booted bantams, and he should know. Richard eventually gave me the bug and on the second attempt at giving me the birds in about 1994, I became hooked. That gave him more room to develop his successful Japanese (in Lavender too), Lavender Polish, Belgian bantams and Silver Grey Dorking bantams to name a few.

The Pekins still had a long way to go, the roundness, the forward tilt and the cushion were yet to develop. There were many handicaps like a lack of knowledge that was to become a "learn as you go" process as I was only a beginner with poultry, though I had much experience with other species of animals and plants since a young child. So I had learned one major attribute – patience! The first non-Lavender quality Pekin outcross to a Lavender developed Pekin always looked the best; the second cross to get the Lavender Colouration often disappointing. The cushion especially was very slow to develop but by 1999 the Lavender were starting to look beautiful, but my biggest problem was at its worst – health.

I believe at around this time a new strain of chronic respiratory disease had hit Australian poultry, I will not elaborate on my theories. Due to my haste I bred from birds that should have been destroyed and used more mature hens. I don't believe in vaccinations and decided treatment was useless so it had to be the axe. My partner, who did most of the killing, said he has never known anyone to kill his/her best birds like I did, but

that's the way it had to be and that's the way it still is. It worked very quickly with Indian Game bantams but much slower with the Pekins, but then I am suspicious of just the smallest sniffle.

One of my most important beliefs is to breed from older birds that are healthy survivors, no matter how poor the type as health is an inherited trait as well. Genetically they are carrying the same genes as their better type brothers and sisters anyway, the simply have the added bonus of a better constitution.

Another of my major handicaps was moving house every couple of years, obnoxious landlords and real estate agents and a year's break in 1996 in the Torres Straits when Richard looked after a pair of and another batch left with a "caretaker".

It is now 2004 and I have my first
Lavender chicks hatching after a year without
them and some have been safely sent down
South where they too are now flourishing.
Without the assistance of many people who
help me out from time to time, or are always
willing to give me a bird back when I need it, I
would have gotten this far with the Lavenders I
have today. Outcrossing and interweaving of
lines and the "death sentence" al are very
important parts in developing healthy fertile
birds.

Lavender behaves in the same fashion as does Black. Wherever there is Black in colour patterns it can be replaced with Lavender, an example being the Coronation sussex. The columbian colour pattern of the Pekin bantam is similar to the Light Sussex being Black on White. It still follows the same principle; a Coronation birds must receive the gene from both parents to exhibit it visually. Lavender mated to Lavender will give only Lavender.

Apart from slight shade variations, all progeny are the same colour, Lavender.

Lavender is a self colour and does not have odd black feathers or specks of black, no lacing of any shade on its feathers. Lavender can have, however, white. It can have white hackles or it can be marked as stated before like a Columbian or Lavender pencilled like a Silver Pencilled. Lavender can be mixed with Buff but this can cause imperfections in the feather. These imperfections are noticed on the secondary feathers of the male where feathers fail to develop properly and often fall out leaving a very scraggy Pekin. The Buff can also cause brassy hackles, especially in Lavender males. The Buff shade can eventually change when mixed with Lavender to a pink or beige colouration like that seen in the Porcelain Belgian and it can cause salmon breast on pullets as one sees in the silver-grey Dorking.

Chicks that are Lavender hatch Lavender and Yellow like one would expect of a Black. If it is solid Lavender in colour one can expect a birchen type colouration (where the Lavender replaces the Black) or a Brown red (but brassy or straw coloured instead of red). If the Lavender is going to be mottled like the normal black with white spots, it will be Lavender with white saddle and spot on the heard, hatching with the down colour comparable to the normal Mottle chicken. Yellow chicks can also hatch and change to Lavender just like a Wheaton Columbian or Silver Duckwing would. Chicks can also hatch with the wild markings but in the lavender variation of Partridge or Silver Pencilled.

There is no reason why a Lavender cannot be equal in quality to a Black or White. This is because, unlike Buff or any of the colours that require special markings as well as type,

the gene can be slotted into any line of Pekins to the extent that it can suddenly reappear out of a line of self colours, ie Blacks or Whites. This is possible because a Lavender line can be nicked into a Black or White line the same way as any breeder upgrades their lines. What seems to be a perfect Black can often throw perfect Whites because Black can mask over White, and so too Black can mask Lavender.

But alas Lavender does have some problems that are usually not obvious in the other colours. One such fault is that many males' tail feathers do not develop properly looking straggly. Some Lavenders have a coarse hard feather while others are perfectly soft as in the other colours, but generally feather quality is an ongoing problem.

As yet I still have much to learn about the colour Lavender, its behaviour and its possibilities.

Judges too have a lot to learn about the difference between Lavender and Blue. Which gives rise to such other questions as: should it be judged as a Blue or should a separate lavender Mottle class/colour be made? What should we call a Lavender Birchen? Should we call a Lavender Columbian a Coronation as in the Sussex? Should we use the names and the specifications of the Belgian bantam's colouration? These colours will appear from time to time as Blacks and Whites are use to upgrade and improve many colurs for type.

The Lavender Pekin is well and truly ensconced in Australia. There are of good type and the gene is hidden in many birds and you cannot tell the carrier from the non-carrier. Too many people believe that lines are pure but they aren't. To create and maintain pure lines requires great skill, perfect records, experience, large numbers and trustworthy help and many

years. Even the best of them need to be upgraded.

Did you know...

Cochins International has a well established Master Breeder Program, whereby members earn points based on the number of Cochins exhibited at shows which host Cochins International meets. There are currently two Master Breeders point total recognition levels. Upon achieving 100 points in any given variety a Cochin Breeder receives a Certificate of Achievement. Master Breeder status is earned upon reaching 500 points in a variety and a plaque is awarded to recognize this achievement.

The club sponsors three types of Cochin International meets: Regional, District, and Nationals. All poultry shows may request meets and all shows may have a Regional meet. Only one District meet is allowed in a given district in a year and there are two Nationals per year, one east of the Mississippi River and the other west of the Mississippi River. International sites are also included in these meets. The eight district directors, which include an international director, place all meets except the Nationals. The Nationals are rotated among the districts and their placement is decided upon by a host club making an official written bid request sent directly to the president of Cochins International. The president then creates a ballot which is sent to the officers and directors to vote on the placement of the Nationals. Again, all shows may have a Regional meet, and it is the responsibility of the show secretaries or members to request these meets from their respective district directors.
