President's Report

Hello everyone! This will be my last article as President of Cochins International. We are in the process of getting together ballots to be mailed out after the beginning of the year, and if you are interested in running for President or Vice-President or any of the Director's positions please let me know. It's an all volunteer force that runs our club, so please consider stepping up to the challenge and keeping our breed club as one of the best going.

I am also working on placing the National Meets for 2009. You will see additional information in future articles in the Poultry Press. You'll find a listing of the National rotation in the newsletter. Keep this rotation in mind if you think a show in your district would like to host a National Meet in the future.

Cochins numbers seem to be holding steady in the show halls, with many reports of

Cochins taking top honors at some of the larger shows. Congratulations to Sheryl Butler on her big win with a Black Bantam pullet at the APA Annual meet at the Seaside Feather Fanciers Show in October.

It's almost breeding season, and I've already started evaluating my birds to determine which will be used in which pen for the 2009 season. As some of you may already know, I am working on Self-Blue Cochins (in addition to other breeding projects). I have an f1 batch of Self Blue splits to Black that show much improved type over their Self-Blue parents. I will be putting together a photo log to show my progress along the way, and will post that on my website over the winter. For the f2 generation I will have to hatch 100 chicks from the f1 splits bred together to get 25 Self-Blues. We'll see how it pans out.

There is some renewed interest in some of the lesser seen varieties in both Large and Bantam Cochins. I know that Dennis Wollard and myself are going to hatch some Golden Laced Large Fowl this year. Matt McCammon now has some Buff Columbian Cochin bantams and so there will be at least two of us working to improve them. I've had several requests for Buff Columbians, but have not been able to fill them because the males don't carry the correct saddle markings just yet. Hopefully between Matt and me we can make some good progress over the next couple years. John Burgess has made a nice start in Birchen Cochin Bantams and has been showing his first generation birds this fall. The type is right there and the color needs some tweaking, but they are looking good. I encourage you to take up the challenge of a parti-colored variety. You don't need to (continued on page 3)

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work on 3 or 4 varieties, but just one additional variety would go a long way to getting more varieties in the show hall.

I am looking forward to a nice Cochin Bantam class at the ABA National in a few weeks. I am taking 21 Bantam Cochins myself, and a handful of large Cochins too. It should be a fun weekend.

Merry Christmas and Happy Holidays. I want to say thanks to everyone for your years of support. It has been fun being your President, and I look forward to many more years in the fancy. I will still be supporting Cochins International in any way I can, but have decided to focus a little more on the fancy from a local perspective, and have taken the post of Show Superintendent and interim Secretary for the Virginia Poultry Breeders Association, and I am also running for District Director of the ABA for District 5.

The Ohio National show in Columbus had great numbers, appeared to be around 5500 birds. It's nice to see the numbers up at


the Poultry shows, and I hope they continue to increase with each coming year.




Canada Report

Northeast District I Report

Hello from New England. As of this writing, the NE1 district fall shows are all done; unfortunately the New England Bantam show was cancelled, but will hopefully be back on track in the spring.

As I write this, a cold winter wind blows and reminds me how we need to help our birds through this difficult season. First, make sure the birds are not subject to any drafts as that is a major cause of sickness. Also, I keep my birds inside during the winter where moisture can accumulate, which is another major contributor to sickness. I keep a window open at the top and run a fan out the other side of the coop. This seems to provide enough ventilation to alleviate the problem. Finally, make sure they have access to water; it can freeze up quickly, leaving them with nothing to drink. I welcome any other interesting information you may have that I can share with our members.

Below are some fall show results that I am aware of who held CI special meets and the NE1 District meet at Boston Poultry Exposition in North Oxbridge, MA.

NE1 District Meet Boston Poultry Exposition (11/2/08) There were 59 cochins entered (44 bantams and 15 large fowl). In bantams; BB and RB went to Bill Ziehm with a black pullet and a black cockerel respectively. The remainder of the class: Whites, 12, BV and RV on a cock and cockerel by Bill Sirrine, Buff, 19, BV to a pullet by Bob Hawes and RV cock to Robert Lightfoot. Bill West won Best and Reserve Asiatic with two large buff Cochin cockerels - an impressive sight on champion row I might add! Best and reserve Junior Cochins went to Aron Leighton with two white pullets. Congratulations to all the winners. I'd like to thank Dorothy Dickinson, Bob Hawes, Ted Howes, Bill Sirrine, Jamie Matts, Bruce Clapp, Robert and Sarah Lightfoot, Linda Blackman, and Norman Rau, for their contributions to our district awards. With your generosity, we were able to present winners

with \$170 in awards. I'd like to give big thanks to the show secretary, Stephen Blash. He made sure our district meet was a success and even provided tee shirts to our winners. In large fowl, Black BV P- Jamie Matts and RV P- Kate Morreale; White BV P- Tom Roebuck, RV H-Kate St. Amour; Blue BV and RV H-Chris Armstrong; Partridge BV- P- Tammy Delong. Thanks to Shari McCollough for supplying me with these results, I'm afraid I'm getting more forgetful as I get older.

Linda Blackman and Bob Hawes were kind enough to provide me with results for the fall *Central Maine Bird Fanciers* show that I was not able to attend. This show was also in honor of Norm Rau as he retires from the fancy so I was especially disappointed in not being able to attend as I wanted to wish him the best. BB was won by Bill Sirrine on a White K and RB to a Buff H by Bob Hawes. BV black hen by Linda Blackman, and Best Blue to Norm Rau on a pullet.

Finally, Bob Hawes provided me with some Cochin results for the *Fall Little Rhody* show. Bob won BB on a buff pullet and Bill Sirrine won RB with a white cockerel.

I hope everyone who reads this has noticed the buff Cochin wins. Progress is definitely being made on this variety. The only remaining show for the NE1 area is the Northeastern Poultry Congress, to be held on February 17 and 18, 2009 at the Eastern States

The Dutch Club Show is planned for the 2nd weekend of December in the city of Enschede and the German Bantam Club will conduct its Club Show the 2nd weekend of Jan 09 in Oyten, near Bremen. Arjun Warnshuis has sent entries in for the Dutch Show and is planning to attend the German Show.

Also in Europe, five (5) cochin clubs (Germany, Denmark, Switzerland, Austria and Holland) have combined to produce a cochin calendar for 2009. This lovely and useful


calendar will be sold in Europe with the proceeds going to the sponsoring clubs.



New Color Varieties in Standard Cochins

(Editors note: the color or these birds are gorgeous in full-color. Hopefully we can get them up on the Cochins International website)
Usually, when one thinks about Large Cochins, the Buffs, Whites or Blacks are the first which come to mind. Varieties like Partridge or Mottled are not as common as these three, and the Barred is seldom to be seen. Not to mention show-quality Silver-Laced or Gold-

Laced Cochins. Perhaps the main reason discouraging the breeders in any attempt with these colors is a simple fact: one can hardly equal the type and size of Large Buffs or Large Blacks. If you add the difficulties in creating the right color pattern, you have the whole picture of breeding these varieties.

But what happens with *new* varieties? What if someone decides to create a completely new variety of Large Cochins? Everybody knows that Bantam Cochins can be found in so many color varieties, and everybody enjoys seeing that diversity in shows. But when one mentions a new color in Large Cochins, this is a completely different story. Why is that? Has diversity ever harmed anyone?

Of course, traditional varieties should be preserved, in as many pure bloodlines as possible, but new varieties could greatly benefit from fresh blood and consequently the heterosis effect, having as result huge size, rapid growth and a better immunity to diseases. The "traditionalists" regarding color varieties in Large Cochins seem to forget that if there hadn't been for careful selection (and in the same time inventive breeding strategies) there wouldn't have been much difference between the "Buffs" and the "Partridge". We would have them like 150 years ago: all of more or less the same color, bad in time according to the

present standard, and with no guarantee whatsoever for the quality of the chicks. Why stop the process? And what is the "definition" of a Large Cochin?

I have experimented with Cochin colors myself, and I even showed my version of a Gold-Quail Cochin cockerel at a local show. The judge first thought that it was a badly-colored Partridge Cochin, and then, after being told what it was, he said I should stop wasting my time and that "serious" breeders should stick to traditional colors. In this case, should tradition be an obstacle for evolution? Just to mention,

that Gold – Quail cockerel was the biggest Cochin male in that show (there were somewhere around 25 Standard Cochin males, young and adult), with good type and a nice temperament. Plus, I had 2 or his brothers at home, in the exact same color, with 4 identically colored hens.

In an interview I did with four of the top Cochin breeders in the world – Peter J.
Heywood, the President of the English Cochin Club, Tom Roebuck, the President of the American Cochin Club (Cochins International), Ardjan Warnshuis, the President of the Dutch Cochin Club, and Beth and Jerry Smith, National Champions in the U.S.A. – when it was published in the June issue of the Aviculture Europe on-line poultry magazine, Ardjan said then when you see a Cochin, size and shape should make you say: Wow! And to further make my point, I'll use another quote from Ardjan: "There is no wrong color on a good horse".

I think this is the "healthiest" attitude towards creating new colors in Large Cochins – again, while in the same time preserving and improving the existing varieties. I have seen various opinions on this, on several forums, and usually breeders seem to dismiss new varieties,

even using words such as "cull" or "bad colored". Who can say that a color is "right"? Is there any universal treaty as to how colors

should be judged? After all, the most difficult thing in breeding Large Cochins is making them big enough, in the best type possible.

These birds should first of all be impressive, and I do not think that color could ever be a drawback in this respect. Such conservatory opinions can make more harm than good, while the creation of new colors could bring more visitors to shows, and maybe some of these visitors will also become Cochin breeders. Varietas delectat - Diversity is delightful. Why should it be different with Large Cochins? Maybe the breeders who want to create new colors should be encouraged, not "pushed aside". Does anyone think that Large Blue-Mottled Cochins are faulty in color? Yet, this is a relatively recent creation. Hopefully, in the years to come, we will be able to admire new varieties of Giant Cochins, with the critical eye of the Cochin standard and the same sense of "beauty" that has led to the present Cochin varieties. Some varieties have already been lost; wouldn't it be a shame to lose, from the start, something that we haven't even created yet?

What an adventure the Featherleg Five had travelling 1200 miles to the APA National in Ventura, California.

The trip originated in Bothell, WA, as our hostess and driver Sheryl Butler lives there. Calesta Rieth, from Spokane, met us at Sheryl's. A sixteen-foot horse trailer was packed from bottom to top with show birds and sale birds. Several exhibitors also sent birds with us as they had made arrangements to fly down. Rising four hours before dawn, on Wednesday, October 22, our journey began. We picked up

Marjorie Best from Oregon City, OR, and Dottie Truedson from Silverton, OR. Since this was going to be a two-day trip, we stopped at a rest area to feed and water all the birds. A rest area attendant walked up to Dottie and told her we

would have to clean up the shavings that had spilled from the carriers. Now imagine, we are parked among the "big rigs" that would blow most of the shavings away just by cranking up their engines. The attendant let us borrow a broom and we began to make that parking lot one spic-and-span place! Has that ever happened to you?

After spending one night on the road, we arrived in Ventura at 8 pm on Thursday evening. We would have to wait one more day to make the birds comfy as set-up wasn't complete. Destination reached!

The scenery along the way was anything boring. I grew up on a small farm and still enjoy living in the country. I learned what a real mountain look like. California is such an agricultural oasis (where watered) and the other is dry wasteland. Such crops as cotton, alfalfa, grapes, fruit and nut trees stretched as far as the eye could see. Thousands of cows in the feed lots – from replacement holstien

heifers to beef cattle destined for our table. Thousands upon thousands of alfalfa hay bales stacked as tall as a five-story building and as wide as a football field. I thought the south had large farms but nothing compared to the vistas I saw through the quarter-inch glass of the '95 red Chevy. I really enjoyed going through the Tejone area, Shasta Mountains and an extremely curvy areas known as "the Grapevine". The show capped Mt Shasta was so beautiful. In contrast, the Tejone area was so dry that it would take 100 acres to feed two grazing cows.

Wow! No better combination to stay on the beach and wake up to see the beautiful flowering tropic plants and the rolling, breaking waves with surfers trying to conquer that expansive flowing water highway. Just four blocks away was the Ventura Fairgrounds which was a first-class facility.

There were 2700 entries with the featherlegs being the largest. There were 132 brahmas, 120 silkies, 110 cochins, 50 d'uccles as well as favorelles in the bantam class. There

were 31 large fowl cochins exhibited. Other than the Featherleg Five, it was a treat to meet other cochin exhibitors — Doris Vosburg, Kaitlin and Ed Hartsell, and Kimberly Parker. The junior cochins were part of the open entries but I didn't meet any of them. The cochins were

top-notch birds with nice heads, good feather width and balanced bodes. The size was comparable to our east coast bird, at least to mine because I prefer the larger cochins.

There were 27 blacks, 20 whites, seven mottled, seven blue, two splash and one partridge in bantams. Bantam frizzle cochins were well represented with 14 black frizzles, 14 white and seven blue frizzles. There were 31 large fowl cochins with blacks having the largest number exhibited with 17.

Sheryl Butler had BB and RB bantam with two equally nice black and white pullets. Doris had BB and RB large fowl on a black hen and cock bird respectively. Sheryl experienced


a once in a lifetime moment as her pretty black pullet was crowned Super Grand Champion of the show. Her hard work and dedication to the cochin breed was rewarded.
