

A Cuckoo Female From Germany

Recently, while browsing the PekinBantams.Com Website maintained by Simon Gambling in the UK, I noticed in the section on breeding pekin (cochin) bantams, an article on "Blue Pekins" by David Plant (Australia). If you breed blues or are interested in breeding them, this article contains a simple, universal chart, in matrix format, which answers the questions about percentages of offspring you can expect when crossing blues, blacks and splash at a glance. This chart would be a very useful reference for those interested in breeding/crossing these three (3) varieties. These questions arise fairly frequently among 4 H'ers, newer breeders and exhibitors and occasionally by some of the "old timers" at shows, club meetings and swaps and thus should serve as a useful reference tool.

Figure out your expected results by color variety by matching your breeding combo, i.e., breeding splash (top row) to black (left column) will give you 100% blue offspring.

Another very interesting article on breeding "Black Pekins" by Alan Featherstone (Australia) provides insight into the art of "double mating" and the advantages of this approach to obtain show quality cockerels and pullets. After you read this article, you will have a much better understanding of the relationship between "yellow legs," white undercolor, bright reddish eye color and purple sheen when breeding black pekin (cochin) bantams.

This website also contains articles on breeding mottled and white verities as well as a wealth of other information for pekin (cochin) bantam breeders, exhibitors and poultry enthusiasts in general and is well worth browsing from time to time. A special "Thanks" goes to Simon Gambling (UK) for making this site available and to David Plant and Allan Featherstone respectively for producing the articles referenced above.

COCHINDAY 2010 GREAT SUCCES

What started as a small private initiative of Gerrit Bosch and myself has grown to a real international event. This year there were 278 birds entered for the show and some 150 birds were for sale. Breeders from seven countries came to Zeddam. Also, this year the birds were judged by experienced breeders in front of the public. Next to the standard colours there also were some new varieties present, such as buff-mottled and porcelain and silverwheaten in frizzle.

Twenty-two Cochins in all colors except partridge. Very nice birds in black, white and blue. Also a good pullet in mottled. Best Cochin was a white pullet from Vanderzande (B). Best opposite sex a buff cockerel from Michiels, also Beligium. Very nice, also, two white pullets bred by B.Molderman (NL). These birds were very large.

What to think of 256 bantams in 22 colors, from which seventeen in frizzle. Silverpatridge (9-13) in very good quality. Best male Nico Anthoni (B) Zg 95. In the females F 96 for Alan v.d.Bogaert (B) and Ulrich Opitz (D). In partridge good quality overall. The birds entered as "goldhalsig" were also partridge. Best in both sexes Freddy Hannes (B). Silver-wheaten with nice birds F 96 for v.d.Bogaert. A large group in black (12-20). In the cockerels the winner was Gerrit Bosch (NL) IZG 95 and in the females IF 96 for Bosch en 2F 96 for Kurt Sneyers (B). The whites were superb. First of all an old cock with IF 96 from Henk Don (NL). In the nineteen cockerels F 96 for Don and Schulte/Thelen (D). In the pullets two times F 96 for H.Don and also for birds of v.d.Bogaert and Schulte/Thelen. A nice pullet with 1F 96 in birchen of Gregorzuk (D). Eleven in porcelain with winner in both sexes Mrs.Croon. A nice buff

mottled pullet from

Anthony Ré (F). The

mottled group was smaller than last year. This time three males and six females. Winner in the males Emily Sprute (juvenile D) with Zg 95. In the females Kurt Sneyers with ZG 95. Three birds in columbia. Zg 95 for Gregorzuk. The same breeder had IZg 95 in columbia-blue marked. Twelve birds in blue. Hannes was winner in both sexes with Zg 95 and F 96. Simone Cepollina had come all the way from Italy with his barred bantams. He got Zg 95 in both sexes. In lavender five males (Zg 95 Sneyers) and twelve females. Here also the winner Sneyers with F 96. A large group in buff. Thirteen males with the winner with F 96 of Bakker (NL). Then eighteen pullets where a bird of Rikie Bosch (NL) got IF 96. The not yet recognized color bobtail with five males and five females from three breeders. This summer a standard prescription was made for this color. This was already the base for judging them on this day. In both sexes the winning birds were from N.Anthoni

with Zg 95. Wheaten with thirteen birds. Winner was H.Winkel (D) in both males and females. Buffcuckoo where the females were better than the males. Here F 96 and Zg 95 for Hannes; K.Wijnen (NL) also got Zg95. In frizzle the best birds were from A.Ré and Rosemarie LutHardt (D). Anthony Ré showed two frizzle pullets in porcelain with outstanding markings. In lavender cuckoo Bart v.d. Bosch had F 96.

Overall winner of the day were a white Cochin pullet from Vandezande and a silverparridge Cochin bantam pullet of Alan v.d.Bogaert. They won the Cochinday rosettes and a prise of € 50,- Best juvenile was Emily Sprute with a mottles bantam cockerel. She won a cup and a rosette. The number of the visitors on that day was remarkably large. Numerous birds were sold, and quality was the main criterium, so that the lesser quality birds remained. Among the judges two new faces. "Good old" Wim Nagels judged the Cochins and Hub Maar did the same with the buff and wheaten bantams. They both did their job well. The whole day had a good atmosphere. People of different nationalities shared their knowledge and also the tables at lunch.





Standard Black Hen


Bantam Blue Hen




Standard White Hen


Bantam Lavender Pullet


