



The following Legacy Awards were presented in 2018: Otes Ray, Sr. Legacy Award: to Rhonda Smith for the Best Bantam Black at the 2018 Southeast District Meet; Maxie Chastain Legacy Award: to Judy Gantt for the Best Bantam White at the 2018 Southeast District Meet; Sandy Isler Legacy Award: to Matt McCammon for the Best Bantam Blue at the 2018 North Central District Meet; Bill Ziehm Legacy Award: to Lisa & Mark Podgwaite for the Best Bantam Black at the 2018 Northeast 1 District Meet; and Sheryl Butler Legacy Award: to Joe Mazur for the Best Bantam Black at the 2018 Western National.

Our State Representative Program launched in February, and we currently have 12 Reps in 6 different Districts. The program has been successful in giving us increased and more localized presence at many shows in our larger Districts. In May, the Board of Directors approved a \$1,000 allocation of funds for awards at District and National Meets. This is in addition to the existing Rosette Awards for National Meets. At the request of so many members, we added long-sleeve tees to our inventory this year! The long-sleeve tees are Heather Navy in color, and our new short-sleeve tees are Heather Indigo in color. The graphic artwork on the back of the tees has also been updated. We're happy to see the new shirts being so well received. We also hope you have had the opportunity to see the new club banners purchased for our tables at shows.

November brought us our newest Variety recognized by the ABA: Self Blue Bantams!! We congratulate all the breeders and exhibitors who put in the years of time, dedication and commitment to this new Variety. Special thanks must go to **Tom Roebuck** for leading the way!

In other ABA and APA news, we told you at the end of 2017 that we were working with both groups to make corrections in their respective Standards. With thanks to **Matt Lhamon**, we were able to accomplish all our goals: The APA has corrected Bantam weights to now be in agreement with Bantam weights as specified by the ABA. Brown Bantams had been accepted by the APA in 1965, but had been dropped in error in the Standard over the years. They have now been re-instated to the Standard of Perfection. In the ABA Bantam Standard, the eye color of Silver Penciled Bantams is now corrected from 'bright red' to 'reddish bay'. We were also successful in providing exhibition numbers for the past several years to qualify Bantam Buff Columbians and Bantam Lemon Blues for recognition now by the APA!!

As we close out 2018, we want to thank a few members that are retiring from our Board of Directors: **Matt Lhamon**, Vice President; **Christopher Rob**, Secretary; **Dustin Drake**, North Central District Director; and **Kathy Stevenson**, Canada District Director. **Teri Frye**, Junior Program Chair; **Linda Lucas**, Memberships and Master Breeder Chair; **Jennifer Etheridge-Robertson**, Texas State Rep; and **Michele Geer**, Oregon State Rep; are also moving on to other opportunities. As many of you know we held an ABA qualifying meet for Self-Blue Cochin bantams at the ABA National hosted by the Ohio Poultry Breeders Association in Columbus, OH, on November 10-11, 2018. Per the ABA rules, for qualifying meets where the variety in question is already recognized (in another breed) the qualifying meet requires 25 entries representing all four classes (cock, hen, cockerel and pullet). We easily met the minimum with 42 entries. Once coop in was complete, I think only two were missing. Participants included, Becky Salinger, Edison Cigany, Kathy Barba, Chelsey Kennedy, Robert Hardina, and Craig Hansen. We even had a couple Junior entries from the Meeks Family. The meet was a huge success thanks the hard work of our breeders and the support from many people in making this happen. Thanks to Cochins International for supporting the initiative, and thanks to Rich Barczewski, Jim Tinsley and Becky Salinger for also sharing the responsibility with me to cover the fees associated with getting a variety recognized. Another big thanks to Becky for coordinating the awards and commemorative glasses. Becky put a lot of work into putting together a special gift basket that each of the Self Blue exhibitors had a chance

to win. Everyone got one ticket for each bird they entered in the class. Chelsey won the basket but had to leave early because she became ill, so a second ticket was drawn and yours truly was the winner. Thanks also to Mike Sayre for donating a custom show carrier for the Best Self-Blue Cochin. This went to the 1<sup>st</sup> Place pullet exhibited by Tom Roebuck.

Not all of our Breeders were able to attend but that doesn't mean they weren't part of this event. Without the hard work of everyone working with this challenging variety, things like this do not happen. Congratulations to Jim Tinsley, Angie Dachel, Wayne Murphy, Dennis Wollard, Jeannette Stecker, Kathy Barba, Robert Hardina, Becky Salinger, Edison Cigany, Sonya Meeks, and all the other breeders working with Self-Blues. Your efforts breeding and showing, and distributing birds to others has helped this striking variety gain some popularity. That's encouraging and we can hope to see them in the show halls for a long time. Next challenge, Best of Breed, and then on to Champion Featherleg. Who knows, maybe one day Champion Bantam and Supreme Show Champions!

Unfortunately, I wasn't able to spend a whole lot of time in the Self-Blue Cochin aisle. I was hired to judge at Columbus, and therefore I was quite busy all day Saturday. Before anyone questions, my showing and judging at the same show, I cleared it with both the ABA and Columbus before even accepting the judging assignment. The Self-Blues could not win anything beyond Best of Variety in the Cochin class and therefore had no bearing on the outcome of the show, so there was no chance of any conflict of interest with my assignment as one of the open show judges. I also didn't do the Cochins. We wanted to make sure everything was on the up and up so there weren't any so called "party fouls." I do know that the pullet class was the largest with probably 15 entries, but each of the other classes had 5 to 10 birds on exhibit. All of the Self-Blues entered were very good examples of the variety. They represented the Cochin type and style well and it was clear that the variety was worthy of approval for recognition as the latest accepted variety in Cochin bantams. We received word from the ABA a couple weeks ago that the ABA Standard Committed and Board had favorably endorsed the recommendation of the qualifying judge Brian Knox to recognize the Self-Blues! Thanks to Brian for a very thorough review and placings of the class. I wish I had the class breakdowns, but I just didn't get a chance to do that. I know that the BV and RV birds were the 1st and 2nd place pullets, both by Tom Roebuck. I will see if we can drum up the complete placings and list them later.

Again, thanks to everyone that helped along the way and congratulation to all of our Self-Blue breeders! Now keep them progressing and get more of them in the show halls!

#### **Important Notice! Please Read!**

There has been a lot of discussion this past year about re-districting, and also about consolidating our two National Meets into one. While they are separate issues, they are uniquely related because our Constitution currently requires Nationals to be rotated among all the Districts. Our Master Breeder program awards points equally, whether the meet is a Special, District or National – the only difference being the more birds exhibited, the more points that can be earned based on our scale of 1 point for every 5 Cochins exhibited in their respective Variety/Class.

We currently have 8 Districts as set forth in the Constitution - 3 have more than 50 members, the other 5 have 26 members or less. Some Districts have states with strict testing requirements; one state is closed entirely to outside exhibitors. Some Districts have multitudes of shows; other Districts are struggling to keep their shows alive. And let's not forget the geographic discrepancies of mileage and travel times to shows. One District Meet per year is provided for, and placement of the District Meet is solely up to the discretion of the District Director.

Two Nationals are provided for every year – one east of the Mississippi, and one west of the Mississippi. Canada is in the western rotation. Bids are solicited for the National Meets, and the Meets are selected by the BOD based on several criteria, including but not limited to the quality of the venue itself, special considerations being offered to the Club, past Cochin attendance, and expected attendance.

No matter what is decided, please remember that we are currently bound by our Constitution; any proposed changes will have to be put forth in a referendum for a vote by the entire General Membership.

The BOD will continue this discussion in 2019, and we want to hear from you!! Your voice and opinions are important to us! Please contact your District Director so that they can bring your suggestions and ideas back to the BOD.

# Judge's Synopsis 2018 Fastern National

Hello CI members!

What a great show you all put on at the Dixie Classic show in Knoxville, TN! The awards were very well thought out. It's nice to see the breeders and exhibitors get something for their efforts.

I would like to talk a little bit about the class. We started the morning doing the Large Fowl Cochins in the open show. The entries were a little lower than I expected but I was surprised when I found an outstanding Partridge hen to give BB honors to. This bird also won champion Asiatic in a nice sized class. The reserve of breed was a blue hen. There were three really nice blue females in the class. I thought they were as good as the Partridge and blacks but they lacked the defined lacing I want to see in a good blue. The black class had a couple of very nice pullets, however I felt they needed just a little more time to mature.

The bantam class took up the remainder of the day. It takes time to evaluate depth AND quality! I had a blast going through them. The blacks were very good. There were two standout males and two standout females. I ended up with going with a pullet for BV and RB. I thought her size and type were pretty spot on. She had a nice skull to match her body too. I noticed a few females throughout the class that I felt were a little narrow in the head. The wing carriage was mostly good throughout. The next largest class was the whites. I found a male that I thought was exceptional in type and carriage. He was a little bigger than the black males but a very good bird nonetheless. The female that was BV white ended up being BB and Best Featherleg. She was in great condition and her type was exceptional. She carried herself up off of the ground just enough to show her shape.

I will group the rest of the birds into this paragraph. There were very good quality birds in all of the varieties exhibited. Most notable was the birchen female that I gave 3rd best bantam cochin to. She had it all going on! I'm not sure how many frizzle cochins were shown but it was by far the most I've seen in my whole 4 years of judging combined. The quality was very nice too with a few placing in the top 10.

There is no doubt the Cochin breed is as strong today as any other breed. The quality is getting much more consistent even in the rarer varieties. Lemon Blues, Barreds, Brown Reds, Splash, all had great representatives of the breed.

Thanks again for trusting me to place your birds. It means a lot to me to be able to judge your national meet. I want to also thank you for the judging certificate I was given Sunday morning. I will frame it and put it on my wall for the memory.

### BREEDING THE PARTRIDGE

by the Late W.C. Carefoot M.Sc. Ph.D. (U.K.)
Compliments. of the research library of the Late W. Plant (AUS)

NOTE- This article was written with the Partridge Wyandotte in mind. References to the British Standard are replicated in the Australian Standard. Exactly the same breeding principles apply to the Partridge Pekin.

British Partridge Wyandottes are paler in colour than the American counterparts, whilst other breeds have identical shades. From the fact that high quality Cockerel Bred Partridge Wyandottes have always thrown white sports, and also birds far too red, it would appear possible that the dilution is caused by the presence of the recessive white gene (c) in a single dose.

The dilution in pullet breeders is different in the fact that no white sports are produced, and it appears possible, that in this case, dilution is caused by the substitution of e+ for eb.

It must be kept in mind when reading what follows, that the British Standard calls for a lighter shade of red than the American. For example, in America, we would not want lemon-edged hackle in a cock-bred female. If this is kept in mind, the reader will find this extremely valuable.

When Partridge Wyandottes were first introduced to the people drawing up the Standard, they decided to go for the simple beauty which has since caused Partridges to be called "The Royalty of The Show Pen". It was a relatively easy matter to decide that the colour of the ideal male would be black with a beetlegreen sheen, and dark undercolour, except for the hackles, shoulders, backs and bays. The hackles were to be black with beetle- green sheen, uniformly edged with lemon, shading to orange at the top of the head, both hackles to match, shoulders and back to be bright red and the wing bays to be bright bay. Likewise, the ideal female had to be soft, light partridge brown ground colour, uniformly penciled with concentric rings of black. The rings to be fine and starting inside the feather, following the shape of the feather. The tail and wing feathers to be black or penciled where they are hidden, and penciled to match the body wherever they are on view. The hackle to be as penciled as possible.

These are very simply defined and precise requirements, but when the breeders attempted to attain these ideals, they found they had problems. If they had a male with a solid stripe in the neck hackle, his female relations were too strong in the black, and this showed itself in black specks in the ground colour of the female. If however, they had a female of correct ground colour, then the male relations were too red, with center cores in the neck hackle, and very little black in the saddle hackle. It therefore became apparent that two pens were required, one to breed exhibition males, and one to breed exhibition females. The former were called Cockerel Breeders, and the latter Pullet Breeders, C.B. and P.B. for short. From this moment on the Partridges were really two colours, the Cockerel Breeders being a black red, and the Pullet Breeders a gold-penciled.

The colour problem was to find the correct mate for the ideal show bird. The complete solution is still not known, but I think we are very close to the answer.

I will try to give the logic behind this problem that may be helpful to breeders of other varieties where double mating is required for colour reasons.

The ideal Partridge Wyandotte of either sex is so precisely marked, that it is inconceivable that the mate for this bird should be anything but equally precisely marked, but this marking may not be so simply described. Since the perfect show bird is unlikely to be available, the mate for a show bird must be chosen to counterbalance the defects in the said show bird.

For this reason, we have to find out which colour patterns in the male correspond with which in the female-We have found several definite results as follows:

- •The neck hackle colour of the female is very close to the lightest part of the neck hackle of the male, and the width of edging is related.
  - •Shaftiness in hackles is related in both sexes.
- •Colour inside the hackles of the male, is related to penciling in the female in some way.
- •Solid black hackles in the male are associated with black specks in the ground color of the female (called "mossiness")
  - •The strength of the black and the beetle green sheen in both sexes is related.
- •Uniformity of body colour in the female is connected with matching hackles in the male.

From our established results we can see that a Cock Bred female must have:

- •Lemon edged neck hackles as bright as possible, and as free from shaft as possible.
- •Beetle green sheen wherever it is possible to be seen, for instance, in the neck and tail. Some of the best CB females shine green on the body in the sunlight.
  - •Very little penciling, with what there is, very course and blurred.
  - •As little shaft on the body as possible, apart from the breast.
  - Primaries as dark as possible

Having got the basic requirements for a CB pullet, other minor details probably determine the selection of the mate for a particular male. For instance, it is likely that if a CB female is completely free from body colour, then her sons may fail in the wing bays, but if she has too much body colour then her sons will have shafty hackles. The margin for error is very fine as can be seen from the fact that a completely sound male with perfect wing bays is very rare indeed. Consequently, the amount of body colour on the female to be chosen, depends on her mate.

The Pullet Breeding male is likewise fairly precisely marked according to the above rules. He must have:


- •Beetle green sheen wherever he is black.
- •Fairly bright neck hackle, the colour of the brightest part of the neck the same as the neck hackle colour of the ideal female. This discovery has led to a virtual disappearance of "foxy" females so predominant a few years ago when the fanciers were frightened that a male with bright neck was partially Cock-bred.
- •Hackles with center core of bay, and not a definite light shaft that will lead to shaftiness in the females.
- •Some red on the breast, as a completely solid black breast is related to heavy penciling.
  - •Wing bays of which an exhibition male would be proud.

As in Cockerel Breeders, the male chosen depends on the female selected. If she is too heavy, choose a male with a little black, provided that what

there is, is the correct black. If she is weak in the penciling then choose a male with plenty of black.

Your breeding results can be seen from the chickens at "unisex" stage of eight weeks or so. At this stage the sexes are most alike in colour. A Pullet Breeding cockerel will have feathers on the lower breast, and on the wing coverts, that are penciled. The cockerels which are the finest and sharpest in penciling and which have these feathers of soft Partridge brown colour, are the ones which contain the potential to breed good coloured females.

It has often been written that the main point in selecting a PB. Male or a CB. Female is that they are bred from a long line of exhibition birds. This of course, is perfectly true, and if a CB. Female or a PB. Male is as I have described, then it is certain that it's pedigree will be true. However, not all birds with correct plumage are themselves worthy of a place in the breeding pen.

# WHITE COCHIN BANTAMS By George Fitterer

The first American White Cochin Bantams were originated by A.P. Groves about twenty years ago. Since that time, many American fanciers have taken to breeding the Whites with the keenest precaution that they might be brought to the highest degree of perfection, and through their care and foresight the popularity of the White Cochin is steadily increasing.

The White Cochins in late years have been indeed a great deal improved both in shape and color. The breeders of today are striving to produce stay-white bantam males.

The three important features in the Cochin Bantams that should be given careful attention are color, shape and feathering. When I mate for type, color, and feathering, I select females that are small and vigorous, possessing good shape and

heavily feathered. Color indeed in not overlooked, for only females that are white to the skin are selected. The shafting of the feathers should be white, not yellow, if you want to breed stay-shite males. A male is selected that is strong in points where the females are weak. Such a mating is bound to give good results.

As to the size of Cochin Bantams, they are guided by the standard which fixes a uniform weight as follows: 30 oz., 26 oz., 24 oz., for cock, hen, cockerel and pullet, and to exceed this weight 4 oz. is to disqualify.

The Cochins should have a broad, deep and well-rounded body, short legs with loose and abundant feathers, and in fact they should be full feathered in cushion, fluff, hocks, shanks, and toes. Long, soft, fluffy plumage is the main characteristic of the Cochin Bantams.


The comb should be single, neat and erect and rather small.

The face should be smooth and fine in texture of skin, wattles and ear lobes rather long, but thin and bright red; neck short and neatly arched with an abundance of hackle plumage; body carried slightly forward with head and tail almost equal in height; back should be short and broad; wings short and tightly tucked up. The main tail (as in the hen) should be short and spread at base, well filled underneath with soft fluffy feathers and enveloped with the coverts or side hangers; thighs are set moderately wide apart and well feathered; shanks short and stout with heavy feathering.

White Cochins hatch out yellow, white and gray. All three colored chicks when feathered out turn out to be nice and white.

The baby chicks are fed on bread first soaked in milk then squeezed dry, for the first week. After the first week a small quantity of a good chick feed is added to their daily feed. For the adult Cochins feed a mash in the morning and some grain in the evening will answer the purpose. Equal parts of wheat, kaffir corn and rice makes an ideal summer grain mixture. Equal parts of wheat and of a good commercial scratch feed will do for the winter months.

A beginner will make no mistake by selecting White Cochin Bantams, for they bred true to color, are easily raised and above all the stand at the head of the list as little egg machines.




